

The Vatican find of 517 Anglo-Saxon silver Pennies was made about the year 1928, reputedly whilst construction work was ongoing at the Vatican Wireless Station. No formal catalogue of the hoard was made before the trove was dispersed in two sales via Glendining in May 1929 and November 1930. George Cyril Brooke annotated catalogues now held in the British Museum, providing the weights latterly used by O'Donovan in his work for the BNJ. His article confirms the presence of two previously unpublished coins at the time of sale, the first with a reported weight of 23.9 grains [c 1.54g] untraced at the point of publication, and the second acquired by British Museum (no. 314). From the form of the moneyer's name as RÆGENALD MO [as opposed to hyphenating to indicate line breaks] it is probable that O'Donovan had noted the Lockett sale in 1960 but simply overlooked this detail by time of publication.



Upon his appointment as Prime Minister on 12 April 1827, Canning had to negotiate with the Whig leader Lord Lansdowne to form a coalition government after seven of the previous cabinet including Wellington and Peel resigned. Whilst initially successful, the pneumonia he had contracted at the funeral of the Duke of York in January of that year, plagued his premiership, leaving George Canning with the rather unceremonious title of the shortest serving Prime Minister in British history (at least at time of print!), surviving just 117 days in office before his untimely death in August 1827. £4,000-5,000

George Vivian Poore (1843-1904), youngest son of Commander John Poore R.N., was educated at the Royal Naval School, New Cross, and University College, London. In 1866 he was awarded the Diploma M.R.C.S.Eng., and served as Medical Officer on board the S.S. Great Eastern when she laid the first transatlantic telegraphic cable later that year. He graduated MB and BS in 1868 and Doctor of Medicine in 1871. At this time he regularly attended on Queen Victoria's youngest son, Prince Leopold, Duke of Albany, and in 1872, at the Queen's behest, he took medical charge of the Prince of Wales during his convalescence, after typhoid fever, in the south of France. In 1876 Poore was appointed Assistant Physician at University College Hospital, becoming full Physician seven years later. He was elected a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians in 1877 and served as Censor. He was Professor of Medical Jurisprudence at University College, 1879-1900, and Professor of Medicine from 1900 until his retirement in 1903. £1,200-1,500

George James Snelus F.R.S. (1837-1906), originally of Workington, Cumberland, was an internationally renowned metallurgist, credited with being the first man to make pure steel from impure iron with the assistance of a Bessemer converter. His achievement as a result of the successful dephosporisation of the pig iron came through the addition of limestone into the convertor (Patent 3530, October 3, 1879). Sharing his discovery with Sir Henry Bessemer, the celebrated Victorian Steel pioneer, Snelus would be recognised with this gold Prize medal from the Iron and Steel Institute, which he would later further repay by serving as its Vice President. Snelus continued to manage the West Cumberland Iron and Steel Works, but owing to the company's monopoly of haematite ores would ironically ignore his innovation. Evidently a restless spirit, Snelus would also argue for the use of steel in railway tracks, a campaign that has indirectly impacted the lives of almost everyone alive on Earth today. He would also serve 32 years in the 1st Cumberland Rifle Volunteers, being noted as a "very successful shot", and eventually retiring with the rank of Honorary Major, with a Long Service Medal. He died, aged 68, in June 1906 at Ennerdale Hall, Frizington, Cumberland. 2019 marks the 150th Anniversary of the Iron and Steel Institure, which since 1975 has operated under Royal Charter as the "Institute of Materials, Minerals and Mining (IOM3)".

Marion Isabel Newbigin was born at Alnwick, Northumberland in 1869, one of five daughters of a local pharmacist. As a biographer latterly put it, soon after began her contribution to 'a sphere largely populated by men, and a lifetime of work that helped to define the study of geography'. Marion would benefit from her father's unusually progressive



stance on education, encouraging her three brothers to pursue careers and independence during their formative years, whilst being equally supportive of her and her sisters in pursuing all possible avenues of education, however limited they were for girls in the latter quarter of the 19th Century.

Engaging with the Edinburgh Association for the University Education of Women, Marion passed her matriculation exams in 1890 and was accepted to study at the University of London, one of the few schemes to allow female students at the time. The following year, aged 22, Marion enrolled at the University of Aberystwyth, engaging in all theatres of science, from mathematics to chemistry, biology to physics. In 1893, she was awarded her BSc in Zoology, and five years later obtained her DSc from the same institution, becoming only its second ever female student to achieve the feat.

Following graduation, Marion found a position amongst scientists at Millport Marine Biological Station analysing and recording data obtained from the groundbreaking Challenger Expedition around the world between 1872 and 1876. She would undertake new research into the natural pigments of plants and animals and eventually publish a book on the subject, entitled: 'Colour in Nature: A Study in Biology'.

Upon the encouragement of James Geikie, Professor of Geology at the University of Edinburgh, Newbigin took up post as editor of the Scottish Geographical Magazine, the publication arm of the Royal Scottish Geographical Society. Her 'bercovian' approach to submissions ensured that the developing field of scientific newcomers would provide regular content to the magazine. Marion also contributed, penning such forward-thinking articles as 'Ice Ages and the Geographical History of Climate'.

The evolution of women's suffrage in the early 20th Century did not pass many, and especially not Newbigin, by unnoticed. In 1916, she was part of the successful movement pressuring the University of Edinburgh to allow female students into all aspects of medical studies. Similarly, Marion aimed to challenge matters of Empire and the emerging politicisation of race, by delineating her writings with a focus on the anthropological aspects of geography and human habitation. Never marrying and having no children allowed Marion to live and teach by her mantra of learning, and to seek out education wherever it could be found. Consequently she argued for teachers to 'be content to open doors', and as aspiring travellers, try not to be bogged down in 'ceaseless journalistic chatter about colonies and dependencies'. In 1923, the Royal Scottish Geographical Society recognised her 'numerous contributions to geographical science' by presenting her this medal, the first female recipient of this prestigious award. Towards the end of her life, she shared her home with two of her sisters. It was here on the 20 July 1934, the date of the RSGS's 50th Anniversary celebration, that she was sadly found to have passed away. The Newbigin Prize for outstanding contributions to RSGS publications was subsequently set up in her memory. This medal was sold to Mr Bartholomew by the Society in order to help fund her legacy prize, and so it is quite apt that the medal reappears again today with the intention of being sold for the benefit of the same philanthropic pursuit and providing some much welcomed funding for the commissioning of future publications for the mass education of children about the subject of Geography.
