INTRODUCTION

Spink has great pleasure in presenting to you the Ennismore collection, one of the finest assemblages of Anglo-Saxon and Viking coins to appear through these rooms, or indeed in the marketplace in many years. Carefully hand-selected by a well-known industry expert, the quality speaks for itself, and the rarity in many places equally so.

This catalogue will take you on a journey through the most formative years in the history of the British Isles in the aftermath of the Roman province Britannia to the Norman Conquest and from the wilds of 7th Century mysticism and the time of Odin, through to the hegemony of Mercia and the martyrdom of an Anglo-Saxon Saint. Next comes the rise of Wessex, inspired by King Alfred whose numismatic legacy forms the heart of the cabinet you see today. From his lowest ebb in AD 871 when he paid off the Vikings to his resettlement of London which he proudly emblazoned on his most iconic monogram type.

Less well known however is the inspiration this coinage had on the Danelaw, with several imitations presently offered that can be traced back to the famous Cuerdale trove. The rise of the Hiberno-Norse Kingdom of Northumbria then present us the 'sleeping jewels' of the collection, all spectacular rarities, especially in their carefully chosen quality. From the frightening prospect of Sihtric 'the One-Eyed' to the familiar Ravens of Anlaf Guthfrithsson - the simple world of the bloody-thirsty Viking is transformed by their numismatic 'communications' - highly simplistic but equally evocative – and undoubtedly all powerful. From the Triquetra to the Danish standard, the cross Moline to the Sword and Mjölnir – all tell a story of a Viking world now largely lost to us. And why? For history is written by the victors, the likes of Aethelstan and Edmund who recaptured York and marked such a triumph on their specie. Then follows the Kings of All England, from the lamentable case of Edward the Martyr to the tribulations of Harefoot's regency. All retold through the humble but mighty silver Penny, a coin that had by now guaranteed the English monetary system for three centuries. But if the story of Harold II reminds us of everything, nothing should be taken for granted, even if such were to drop from the sky.

The century succeeding AD 650 was a formative period in the history of this island. From which would emerge a socio-political structure of governance named the 'Heptarchy' {v: '*Seofonrice*'} of ruling 'petty' English kingdoms, and a universal religion - Christianity. The independent territories of Kent, East Anglia and Northumbria were among the first to transition away from paganism, thanks to the papal missions of Augustine in AD 595 and Paulinus in AD 604. In the West Midlands, the territory of Mercia proved more resistant to change. Their legendary King Penda waged war against the Northumbrians at Hatfield Chase in AD 633 and again at Maserfield in AD 641/42 where he twice succeeded in killing their king - both slain rulers would later be venerated as Christian martyrs.

Following this initial turbulence, it would appear that the Midlands then experienced a period of sustained prosperity during which time this coinage was struck. East Anglia and Mercia would record lengthy reigns and seamless transitions of Royal power between Ealdwulf (663-713) and Ælfwald (713-749) in the East, and Æthelbald (716-757) in the West. While coining locations have yet to be firmly established, the newly-prospering municipalities of Ipswich and Norwich are probable candidates for mint sites, like that established for Southampton {'Hamwic'}.

The concept of hedging one's religious beliefs is the defining aspect of life in this era, with Pagan and Christian influences clearly visible on this coin. On one side: the imagery of 'Odin', the Norse God of wisdom and death, and on the other: the symbol of a cross pommée redolent those borne on contemporary Heraclian gold Solidii from Byzantium. Both are symbolic, and both allegories of life and death. Perhaps such a message reflects a widely-held insecurity about the spiritual unknown? A similar fear gripped the occupant of the Sutton Hoo ship - a man who quite literally held a drinking horn in one hand, and a baptismal spoon in the other. However, the blending of such imagery may have been intended as message of hope instead - the possibility of life imitating art - side-by-side - two diametrically opposed religions peacefully co-existing. Whatever the true purpose, within mere decades of coining, the monastery at Lindisfarne would be desecrated, and the opinion of this newly fostered Christian isle forever tarnished by the 'heathen'.


The numismatic record testifies to the elevated position of the moneyer Eoba within the Mercian Royal court, and loans to us a great number of his issues from the earliest identified in the hegemon's reign through to his Royal apogee - both artistically and imperially. As Gannon has noted: 'Offa's coinage mirrors the richness of Anglo-Saxon art, stress[ing] the experimental, even the exotic, besides the traditional in some designs; thus one can postulate at the wealth of models available, and the taste and curiosity of the King.' Evidently his trusted status, along with that of the contemporary moneyers Ealhraed and Lul(la), enabled Eoba to produce this dramatic series which simultaneously portrayed Offa in the guise of a Roman Emperor, as well as providing the official introduction of his Queen Cynethryth in a tandem issue. Previous interpretation has concluded that Eoba simply miscalculated the first renderings of the dies and mistakenly removed the King's name to the reverse, whilst elevating his own to be that next to the portrait. Ealhraed is known to have performed the same feat on his own issue (Chick 92), before subsequent permutations restore the Royal 'precedent' (Chick 93-98). However, there may be a more practical explanation for this 'mistake', with the obvious clue coming from the highly competent rendering of the 'King'. This has evidently been cut by London diesmiths, and undertaken at a mint site where Offa could have more oversight of his prototype. As Naismith notes: 'Eoba highlights the directness with which Kings could at times take a hand in minting, but also that this role might be mediated through specific moneyers.'



As the procedure added a degree of separation to the usual minting procedure, and in advance of receipt of the new 'model', it is conceivable that the Canterbury moneyers pre-prepared their own reverse dies to marry with the new design. The realisation of the mistake in punching the King's name into their own die, would only be noticed upon receipt of the London hubs, leaving the somewhat awkward 'fudge' to further satisfy the need for the moneyer's name to also appear on the new coin. This would account for the subsequent variants where the legends are swapped as the portraits begin to exhibit local engraving flair (Chick 93-98). There are however other possibilities for this somewhat bizarre marriage with a numismatic precedent found in the Sceatta series of portrait and moneyer types of the earlier 8th Century, as well as the Roman Republican issues of denarii that no doubt appeared to Saxon farmworkers as had the 4th century prototype which first inspired the design of the present coin. Perhaps these iconographic inspirations are also the very source of the metal used to produce this new and highly considered coinage. For Offa perhaps the creation of this portrait was not just a personal boast about being modelled as a Roman Emperor, but in fact a very real statement of his intent his world-view: the renewal, renovation and 'restitution' of Imperial power under him.



Little is known of Cynethryth's ancestry, although previous scholarship has connected her name to the legendary Mercian King Penda († 655) by way of his similarly-named wife and daughters (Cynewise, Cyneburh, and Cyneswith). Medieval historiographies however point to Frankish origins and possible exile from the continental Royal court, a factor which would account for Offa's subsequent pretence in ruling Mercia in the likeness of Charlemagne. The date of her marriage to Offa is not recorded, but Cynethryth begins appearing on Royal charters after the birth of the heir apparent, Ecgfrith in AD 770. A decade later, she is recorded as 'Regina Merciorum' and it is assumed her coinage begins soon after - the only Anglo-Saxon Queen to have such an honour.

At time of publication, only fifty-four coins of Cynethryth have been documented; fifty-two from the period of Offa's 'Light coinage' in the name of the 'Royal engraver' Eoba, and two recent single fragmentary finds in the name of 'Heavy coinage' moneyer Ludoman at London. At least thirteen of this total number are held institutionally, with the remaining examples available to commerce varying wildly from unstable fragments to the imposing examples recovered from the Aiskew Hoard (2006) and the Bascom-Lockett-Norweb specimen last seen at public sale in 1999. Although Chick divides his corpus into eleven types (nos. 138-148), realistically but four core varieties exist for her coinage: three portrait issues which make up three-quarters of the present corpus, and one non-portrait type as the example here. The dominant role of Eoba in the production of this series is abundantly clear, with the varieties in his emissions explained by the use of skilled London engravers as well as local craftsmen at his Canterbury workshop. Only twelve examples of her non-portrait type are currently known, with nine in private ownership and over half of those are chipped or in a fragmentary state. This renders the present offering quite remarkable within her numismatic corpus and equally noteworthy amongst the paucity of surviving material history from her reign.

The discovery of a new type within the Anglo-Saxon corpus would always be a red letter day. To add a new variety for a King at the centre of a 1,200 year-old murder mystery at the Mercian court is nothing short of historic.

Yet, that is what was achieved on 3 March 2014, during a prophetic hailstorm in the Pevensey area of East Sussex. The coin, unlike any of the three previously recorded coins of Æthelberht II, provides us a model as meticulous in engraving finery as it displays the confidence of her subject. It is thought that the coin demonstrates the political maneuvrings by this client king under the hegemony of Mercia, and a pretension therein towards independence. The juxtaposition of both name and title -?RE+' ['King'] may well have been the catalyst for the King's infamous execution at Sutton Walls on 20 May 794. The same legend styles are found on the Kentish issues of Eadberht **Præn** (lot 5), a known rebel in the South east after Offa's death.

Whilst the particular chain of events at Hereford remain unclear, the subsequent remorse Offa felt for the beheading is apparent. In atonement for his grevious sin, Offa sought the story of another Christian martyr, and elected to found an Abbey on the site. The development of St Albans (see right) as an ecclesiastical centre was borne of this decision.

With both recorded examples of this moneyer from the Whitehorse (Croydon, 1862), and the Beeston Tor Cave (1924) finds accessioned into the British Museum cabinets, the provenance for this coin remains somewhat of a mystery, although a hoard discovery is also probable. On 7 July 1870, Sotheby's auction rooms saw the dispersal of W. Cotton Risley's collection, late Curate of Deddington, Oxon. His cabinet featured amongst others Saxon coins, ten Burgred Pennies, one Aethelberht, one Aethelred I, and four Alfred coins, all described as in 'varied' condition. The latter two were noted thus: "Alfred, bust to right, as Hawkins n. 172, the moneyers HEREMOD. and TORTHMUND. the letters curiously dipthonged, both fine.' Such a collection would be entirely consistent with an early 10th Century hoard, the mixture and absence of duplication within the Burgredians suggestive of a selected parcel from a larger find.

Little is known of the mysterious 'Barge Yard' discovery other than two scant references in later sale catalogues. Interestingly the location of the find (see right) is very close to Walbrook; the site of a major find of Edward the Confessor Pennies in the same year. It is evident that both therefore must have been unearthed during wider excavations related to the construction of Queen Victoria Street Mysteriously the Roman discoveries from these archaeological invertigations are well documented, including the fine 'Bucklersbury Mosaic' transferred to the Guildhall on 12 June 1869 (Illustrated London News, inset) and the preparatory illustrations of nails drawn by one Beatrix Potter.



CTCE records just four examples of this delightful coin, two in institutions, and two in private hands. The other example has not been seen at public auction since the Mack dispersal of 1977. Recent research has suggested that the Dean (Cumberland) find (c. 1780) is the likely origin of the Mack coin, having passed through the Keswick Museum, before entering the cabinets of Samuel Tyssen and the British Museum duplicate sale (1811), before a reappearance in the Dimsdale cabinet in 1824. The provenance chain can from there be reconstructed, unbroken, down to Montagu's own duplicate sale in 1888. For Montagu to have sold his Brice collection 'duplicate', suggests that he already possessed the present specimen, with the most obvious source at the time being the collection of Samuel Addington, from whom he had purchased en bloc in 1883. Although this attribution is merely conjectural, it is worth noting that research is greatly hindered by the widespread confusion in attribution of 'EADWEARD' signed coins, with an early commentator attempting:

'The three Edwards before, and as many after the Norman Advent being not easily distinguished, I shall here add what in my apprehension will most effectively distinguish those under our present consideration: Those with the half-face, crown and sceptre, I ascribe to Edward the Elder, those with the full face (as he is represented on the Great Seal) and arched crown to Edward the Confessor; and the third sort, without either Crown or Sceptre, and indeed for the most part without any effigies at all, to this Edward [the Martyr], the son of Eadgar.'

This coin appears to be the first recorded and only known coin of the moneyer Brant for Regnald, a king whose numismatic record is notoriously pauce. CTCE assigns the 'Triquetra type' to Group V, covering the reigns of Anlaf Guthfrithsson (cf. lot 21), Anlaf Sihtricsson (lot 23) and Regnald Guthfrithsson (2 examples noted). Since publication, several additions can be made to this corpus, although the examples for Regnald remain excessively rare. To date only four have been recorded, including the present coin, which holds the notably further distinction of being the only complete coin of its type known either to commerce or institutionally. By way of comparison, the fame of Eric the Bloodaxe is matched by the size of his numismatic legacy - no fewer than thirty-nine coins of his are now recorded, yet only a dozen are known for Regnald. 

Mossop (Lincoln Mint, 1970) lists two coins with this die combination. The first is not illustrated, but is noted as: '1.37g - AHFB'. The second, is illustrated by Mossop and is evidently not the present coin which has since 1974 been housed by the Lincoln Museum [SCBI 27, no. 14, 1.39g]. Prior to 1970, deduction and process of elimination is required to reconstruct the provenance. Mossop's own collection acquired by Baldwin in 1967 is known to have contained a coin of Levig from the Willes' parcel of Oakham (Rutland) coins - that coin appeared in the cabinet of Dr Erik Miller sold through these rooms in March 2019.

Consequently the attribution of the present specimen to the Baldwin family collection seems beyond reasonable doubt, as to does the possibility of construction an earlier provenance based on past catalogue descriptions. In the Wheeler sale of 1930, famously boycotted by many collectors who found his aggressive purchasing style unfavourable, just such a coin is transcribed and bought by Baldwin (lot 45, £3.0.0). Crucially the additional detail of the trefoil stop at end, and pellet in O add to confidence of a die match in the absence of a physical plate illustration.

From this listing is given the earlier provenance through the cabinets of Major Carlyon-Britton, Hyman Montagu and Brice. The first has no such listing in any of his three catalogues produced in the Great War years so we must conclude that it was transacted privately or as part of his fixed price offerings through the Numismatic Circular (cf. November-December 1919). More luck is found in the Montagu sale, wherein his lot 755 matches the Wheeler description, and also reconfirms the Brice pedigree. Prior to this the provenance is not known, although examples of this reverse reading are to be found in the infamous Colonel Durrant collection sold in 1847, suggesting the origins for this coin extend back even further. Supporting this is the beautiful patination and exquisite surfaces pointing to a likely recovery from the Oakham trove that is known to have aided the formation of the Hermitage and Hunterian cabinets.

Harthacnut was occupied in Denmark at the time of his accession allowing his half-brother Harold Harefoot to assume the Regency of the English kingdom. However following the barbaric murder of Ælfred Æþeling, and unsure how he would be received by his subjects, Harthacnut invaded England in June 1040. Harold however was already dead, succumbing to illness that Spring in Oxford aged just 24

Harthacnut subsequently permitted Harold to be exhumed from Westminster Abbey, have his body decapitated and thrown in fens near the Thames.

Unused to English Royal custom, Harthacnut replicated the autocratic regime he had honed in Denmark with his council. This included the regular and unpopular raising of taxation to pay for projects such as the increase of the English navy. On one occasion in 1041, two of his tax officials were killed whilst trying to extract levies from the local populace in Worcester. Harthacnut responded with a 'harrying' punishment, some three decades before the Normans would attempt the same.

In the same year, a dispute arose between the Earl of Northumbria, Siward and Earl Eadwulf of Bernicia who ruled the northern part of the same region semi-independently. Harthacnut was not satisfied by this arrangement, and therefore colluded to murder Earl Eadwulf on the pretence of granting him safe conduct. The murder would be widely condemned, and the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle rebuke the king as an "oath-breaker". To the church however, he would be far more charitable, with Ramsey Abbey one of several institutions that would later laud him for his benevolence.

A long term sufferer of tuberculosis, Harthacnut would succumb to a stroke at the wedding of Tovi the Proud, former standard-bearer to King Cnut at Lambeth on 8 June 1042.

We shall not be liable to you for any loss suffered as a result of you following the currency converter.

4.8 Video images

At some auctions there will be a video screen. Mistakes may occur in its operation, and we cannot be liable to you regarding either the correspondence of the image to the Lot being sold or the quality of the image as a reproduction of the original.

4.9 Bidding Increments

Bidding generally opens below the low estimate and advances in the following order although the auctioneer may vary the bidding increments during the course of the auction. The normal bidding increments are:

4.10 Bidding by Spink

- 4.10.1 We reserve the right to bid on Lots on the Seller's behalf up to the amount of the Reserve (if any), which will never be above the low estimate printed in the auction catalogue.
- 4.10.2 The Spink Group reserves the right to bid on and purchase Lots as principal.
- 4.10.3 Lots with this symbol (\textcircled) indicate that a party has provided Spink with an irrevocable bid on the lot that will be executed during the sale at a value that ensures that the lot will sell. The irrevocable bidder, who may bid in excess of the irrevocable bid, will be compensated based on his bid in the event he or she is not the successful bidder or may receive a fixed fee in the event he or she is the successful bidder. If the irrevocable bidder is the successful bidder, the fixed fee for providing the irrevocable bid may be netted against the irrevocable bidder's obligation to pay the full purchase price for the lot. If the irrevocable bid is not secured until after the printing of the auction catalogue, a pre-sale announcement will be made indicating that there is an irrevocable bid on the lot.

4.12 Successful Bid

Subject to the auctioneer's discretion, the striking of his hammer marks the acceptance of the highest bid, provided always that such bid is higher than the Reserve (where applicable), and the conclusion of a contract for sale between you and the Seller.

4.13 After Sale Arrangements

If you enter into any private sale agreements for any Lot with the Seller within 60 days of the auction, we, as exclusive agents of the Seller reserve the right to charge you the applicable Buyer's Premium in accordance with these Terms and Conditions, and the Seller a commission in accordance with the terms of the Seller's agreement.

4.14 Return of Lot

4.14.1 Once your bid has been accepted for a Lot then you are liable to pay for that Lot in accordance with these Terms and Conditions. If there are any problems with a Lot then you must notify us within 7 days of receipt of the Lot, specifying the nature of the problem. We may then request that the Lot is returned to us for inspection. Save as set out in clause 5.13, the cancellation of the sale of any Lot and the refund of the corresponding purchase price is entirely at our sole discretion. We will not normally exercise that discretion if the Lot is not received by us in the same condition that it was in at the auction date.

4.14.2 No lot may be returned on account of condition if the condition was stated by a third party grading company (including, but not limited to PCGS, NGC, ANACS, ICG, PMG, WBG, Legacy Currency Grading).

5 AFTER THE AUCTION

5.1 Buyer's Premium and other charges

In addition to the Hammer Price, you must pay us the Buyer's Premium at a rate of 20% of the final Hammer price of each lot, postage charge and a fee for paying by card.

5.2 Value Added Tax

Other than in respect of Zero-rated Lots (o) VAT is chargeable on the Hammer price and the Buyer's premium of daggered (\uparrow) and (Ω) lots at the standard rate (currently 20%), and on lots marked (x) at the reduced rate (currently 5% on the Hammer price and 20% on the Buyer's premium). VAT on Margin scheme lots (identified by the absence of any VAT symbol next to the lot number) is payable at 20% on the Buyer's premium only.

5.3 VAT Refunds

- General
 - 5.3.1 As we remain liable to account for VAT on all Lots unless they have been exported outside the EU within 3 months of the date of sale, you will generally be asked to deposit all amounts of VAT invoiced. However, if a Spink nominated shipper is instructed, then any refundable VAT will not be collected. In all other cases credits will be made when proof of export is provided. If you export the Lot yourself you must obtain shipping documents from the Shipping Department for which a charge of £50 will be made.
 - 5.3.2 If you export the Lot you must return the valid proof of export certificate to us within 3 months of the date of sale. If you fail to return the proof of export certificate to us within such period and you have not already accounted to us for the VAT, you will be liable to us for the full amount of the VAT due on such Lot and we shall be entitled to invoice you for this sum.
 - 5.3.3 To apply for a refund of any VAT paid, the proof of export certificate must be sent to our Shipping Department clearly marked 'VAT Refund' within 3 months of the date of sale. No payment will be made where the total amount of VAT refundable is less than £50 and Spink will charge £50 for each refund processed.

VAT Refunds - Buyers from within the EU

- 5.3.4 VAT refunds are available on the Hammer Price and Buyer's Premium of Daggered (†) and Investment Gold (g) Lots. You must certify that you are registered for VAT in another EU country and that the Lot is to be removed from the United Kingdom within 3 months of the date of sale.
- 5.3.5 Where an EU buyer purchases a Lot on which import VAT has been charged, no refund of VAT is available from us. It may be possible to apply directly for a refund on form VAT 65 to HM Revenue & Customs Overeseas Repayment Section, Londonderry.

VAT Refunds - Buyers from outside the EU

- 5.3.6 Where a Lot is included within the Auctioneers' Margin Scheme and evidence of export from the EU is produced within 3 months of the date of sale, the VAT on Buyer's Premium may be refunded.
- 5.3.7 Where the Lot is marked as a Daggered (†) Lot the VAT charged on the Hammer Price may be refunded where evidence of export from the EU is produced within 3 months of the date of sale. A refund of VAT charged on the Buyer's Premium can also be made on receipt of proof of business as a collectibles dealer.
- 5.3.8 Where the Lot is marked as an Omega (Ω) Lot or an Import VAT (x) Lot and evidence of export from the EU is produced within 3 months of the date of sale, the VAT charged on both the Hammer Price and Buyer's Premium may be refunded. Where required, we can advise you on how to export such Lots as a specific form of export evidence is required. Where we advise you on the export of the Lots, please be aware that the ultimate responsibility in respect of obtaining a valid proof of export certificate will lie with you and we will not be responsible for your failure to obtain such certificate.
- 5.3.9 Lot marked as Investment Gold (g) is exempt from VAT on Hammer price. A refund of VAT charged on the Buyer's Premium can be made on receipt of proof of business as a collectibles dealer and where evidence of export from the EU is produced within 3 months of the date of sale.
- 5.4 Payment
 - 5.4.1 You must provide us with your full name and permanent address and, if so requested, details of the bank from which any payments to us will be made. You must pay the full amount due (comprising the Hammer Price, the Buyer's Premium and any applicable VAT) within seven days after the date of the sale. This applies even if you wish to export the Lot and an export licence is (or may be) required.

 5.4.2 You will not acquire title to the Lot until all amounts due have been paid in full. This includes instances where special arrangements were made for release of Lot prior to full settlement.
 5.4.3 Payment should be made in sterling by one of the following methods:

Please note that the processing charges for payments made by cheques or bank drafts drawn on a non-U.K bank shall be met by you. Please ensure that the remittance slip printed at the bottom of the invoice is enclosed with your payment.

- (iii) By Visa or Mastercard. All Corporate cards regardless of origin and Consumer debit and credit cards issued outside the EU are subject to a fee of 3%. For all card payments there are limits to the amounts we will accept depending on the type of card being used and whether or not the cardholder is present.
- 5.4.4 Payments should be made by the registered buyer and not by third parties, unless it has been agreed at the time of registration that you are acting as an agent on behalf of a third party.

5.5 Invoices

Invoices may consist of one or more pages and will show: Zero rated Lots (0); no symbol Lots sold under the Auctioneers' Margin Scheme; Lots marked (g) special scheme Investment Gold; Daggered Lots (†), imported Lots marked (x) and (Ω) , (e) Lots with Zero rated hammer for EU VAT registered buyers.

5.6 Collection of Purchases

- 5.6.1 Unless specifically agreed to the contrary, we shall retain lots burchased until all amounts due to us, or to the Spink Group, have been paid in full. Buyers will be required to pay for their lots when they wish to take possession of the same, which must be within 7 days of the date of the sale, unless prior arrangements have been made with Spink. Without prior agreement, lots will not be released until cleared funds are received with regard to payments made by cheque
- 5.6.2 Unless we notify you to the contrary, items retained by us will be covered in accordance with our policy which is available for inspection at our offices from the date of sale for a period of seven days or until the time of collection, whichever is sooner. After seven days or from the time of collection, whichever is the earlier, the Lot will be entirely at your risk.
- 5.6.3 Our policy will not cover and we are unable to accept responsibility for damage caused by woodworm, changes in atmospheric conditions or acts of terrorism.

5.7Notification

We are not able to notify successful bidders by telephone. While Invoices are sent out by email or mail after the auction we do not accept responsibility for notifying you of the result of your bid. You are requested to contact us by telephone or in person as soon, as possible after the auction to obtain details of the outcome of your bids to avoid incurring charges for late payment.

5.8

- Packing and handling

- 5.8.2 It is the responsibility of the Buyer to be aware of any Import Duties that may be incurred upon importation to the final destination. Spink will not accept return of any package in order to avoid these duties. The onus is also on the Buyer to be aware of any Customs import restrictions that prohibit the importation of certain collectibles. Spink will not accept return of the Lot(s) under these circumstances. Spink will not accept responsibility for Lot(s) seized or destroyed by Customs.
- 5.8.3 If the Buyer requires delivery of the Lot to an address other than the invoice address this will be carried out at the discretion of Spink

5.9 Recommended packers and shippers

If required our shipping department may arrange shipment as your agent. Although we may suggest carriers if specifically requested, our suggestions are made on the basis of our general experience of such parties in the past and we are not responsible to any person to whom we have made a recommendation for the acts or omissions of the third parties concerned.

5.10 Remedies for non-payment or failure to collect purchases

- 5.10.1 If you fail to make payment within seven days of your stipulated payment date set out in your invoice, we shall be entitled to exercise one or more of the following rights or remedies:
 - 5.10.1.1 to charge interest at the rate of 2% per month compound interest, calculated on a daily basis, from the date the full amount is due;
 - 5.10.1.2 to set off against any amounts which the Spink Group may owe you in any other transaction the outstanding amount remaining unpaid by you;
 - 5.10.1.3 we may keep hold of all or some of your Lots or other The instantian property is the operation of the spink Group until you have paid all the amounts you owe us or the Spink Group, even if the unpaid amounts do not relate to those Lots or other property. Following fourteen days' notice to you of the amount outstanding and remaining unpaid, the Spink Group shall have the gridt to greater the other of such Lots or other property. We the right to arrange the sale of such Lots or other property. We shall apply the proceeds in discharge of the amount outstanding to us or the Spink Group, and pay any balance to you;
 - 5.10.1.4 where several amounts are owed by you to the Spink Group in respect of different transactions, to apply any amount paid to discharge any amount owed in respect of any particular transaction, whether or not you so direct;
 - 5.10.1.5 to reject at any future auction any bids made by you or on your behalf or obtain a deposit from you before accepting any bids.
- 5.10.2 If you fail to make payment within thirty-five days, we shall in addition be entitled:
 - 5.10.2.1 to cancel the sale of the Lot or any other item sold to you at the same or any other auction;

- 5.10.2.2 to arrange a resale of the Lot, publicly or privately, and, if this results in a lower price being obtained, claim the balance from you together with all reasonable costs including a 20% seller's commission, expenses, damages, legal fees, commissions and premiums of whatever kind associated with both sales or otherwise, incurred in connection with your failure to make payment;
- 5.10.2.3 when reselling the Lot, place a notice in our catalogue stating that you successfully purchased the Lot at auction but have subsequently failed to pay the Hammer Price of the Lot; or 5.10.2.4 take any other appropriate action as we deem fit.
- 5.10.3 If you fail to collect within fourteen days after the sale, whether
 - or not payment has been made, you will be required 5.10.3.1 to pay a storage charge of £2 per item per day plus any
 - additional handling cost that may apply. 5.10.3.2 you will not be entitled to collect the Lot until all outstanding charges are met, together with payment of all other amounts due to us.
- 5.11 Use of Default Information

If you fail to make payment for a Lot in accordance with these Terms and Conditions:

- 5.11.1we reserve the right to refuse you the right to make bids for any future auction irrespective of whether previous defaults have been settled; and
- you acknowledge that we may (as necessary for our legitimate interests those of other auctioneers and live bidding platforms in 5.11.2 referencing customers and avoiding customer defaults) disclose details of such default to other auctioneers and live bidding platforms, which will include your name, address, nature of the default and the date of the default.

Auctioneers or live bidding platforms who receive details of the default may rely on such information when deciding whether to enter into a transaction with you in the future.

- 5.12 Export Licence
 - 5.12.1 If required we can, at our discretion, advise you on the detailed in relation to export licensing regulations. Where we advise you in relation to export licensing regulations the ultimate responsibility in respect of any export will lie with you and we will not be responsible for your failure to apply for any necessary licences.
 - 5.12.2 If the Lot is going to be hand carried by you, you may be required to produce a valid export licence to us or sign a waiver document stating that a licence will be applied for.
 - 5.12.3 You should always check whether an export licence is required before exporting. Export licences are usually obtained within two or three weeks but delays can occur.
 - 5.12.4 Unless otherwise agreed by us in writing, the fact that you wish to apply for an export licence does not affect your obligation to make payment within seven days nor our right to charge interest on late payment.
 - 5.12.5 If you request that we apply for an export licence on your behalf, we shall be entitled to recover from you our disbursements and out of pocket expenses in relation to such application, together with any relevant VAT.
 - 5.12.6 We will not be obliged to rescind a sale nor to refund any interest or other expenses incurred by you where payment is made by you despite the fact that an export licence is required.

5.13 Refund in the case of Forgery

- 5.13.1 A sale will be cancelled, and the amount paid refunded to you if a Lot (other than a miscellaneous item not described in the catalogue) sold by us proves to have been a Forgery. We shall not however be obliged to refund any amounts if either (a) the catalogue description or saleroom notice at the auction date corresponded to the generally accepted opinion of scholars or experts at that time, or fairly indicated that there was a conflict of opinions, or (b) it can be demonstrated that the Lot is a Forgery only by means of either a scientific process not generally accepted for use until after publication of the catalogue or a process which at the date of the auction was unreasonably expensive or impracticable or likely to have caused damage to the Lot. Furthermore, you should note that this refund can be obtained only if the following conditions are met:
 - 5.13.1.1 you must notify us in writing, within seven days of the receipt of the Lot(s), that in your view the Lot concerned is a Forgery;
 - 5.13.1.2 you must then return the item to us within fourteen days from receipt of the Lot(s), in the same condition as at the auction date; and
 - 5.13.1.3 as soon as possible following return of the Lot, you must produce evidence satisfactory to us that the Lot is a Forgery and that you are able to transfer good title to us, free from any third party claims.
 - 5.13.1.4 you must provide to us all evidence obtained by you that a Lot is a Forgery no later than 7 days after you receive such evidence.
- 5.13.2 In no circumstances shall we be required to pay you any more than the amount paid by you for the Lot concerned and you shall have no claim for interest
- 5.13.3 The benefit of this guarantee is not capable of being transferred, and is solely for the benefit of the person to whom the original invoice was made out by us in respect of the Lot when sold and who, since the sale, has remained the owner of the Lot without disposing of any interest in it to any third party.
- 5.13.4 We shall be entitled to rely on any scientific or other process to establish that the Lot is not a Forgery, whether or not such process was used or in use at the date of the auction.

6 LIABILITY

Nothing in these Terms and Conditions limits or excludes our liability for: 6.1 death or personal injury resulting from negligence; or

6.2 any damage or liability incurred by you as a result of our fraud or fraudulent misrepresentation.

7 USE OF YOUR PERSONAL INFORMATION

- 7.1 We will use the personal information you provide to us as set out in our privacy notice (available at https://spink.com/privacy-policy) and in particular to:
 - 7.1.1 process the bids you make on Lots (whether successful or otherwise) and other auction related services we provide;
 - 7.1.2 process your payment relating to a successful purchase of a Lot;
 - 7.1.3 arrange for delivery of any Lot you purchase, which will include passing your details to shipping providers and, on overseas deliveries, to customs where they make enquiries regarding the Lot;
 - 7.1.4 inform you about similar products or services that we provide, but you may stop receiving these at any time by contacting us.
- 7.2 In accordance with clause 4.2, we may pass your information to credit reference agencies in order to obtain credit checks from them, and they may keep a record of any search that they do.
- 7.3 In accordance with clause 5.11, where you default on making payment for a Lot in accordance with these terms and conditions we may disclose details of such default to other auctioneers and live bidding platforms.
- 7.4 We are also working closely with third parties (including, for example, other auctioneers and live bidding platforms) and may receive information about you from them.
- 7.5 Where you provide us with personal information about other individuals, you must ensure that your provision of that information is compliant with applicable data protection law.

8 COPYRIGHT

- 8.1 We shall have the right (on a non-exclusive basis) to photograph, video or otherwise produce an image of the Lot. All rights in such an image will belong to us, and we shall have the right to use it in whatever way we see fit.
- 8.2 The copyright in all images, illustrations and written material relating to a Lot is and shall remain at all times our property and we shall have the right to use it in whatever way we see fit. You shall not use or allow anyone else to use such images, illustrations or written material without our prior written consent.

9 VAT

You shall give us all relevant information about your VAT status and that of the Lot to ensure that the correct information is printed in the catalogues. Once printed, the information cannot be changed. If we incur any unforeseen cost or expense as a result of the information being incorrect, you will reimburse to us on demand the full amount incurred.

10 NOTICES

All notices given under these Terms and Conditions may be served personally, sent by 1st class post, or faxed to the address given to the sender by the other party. Any notice sent by post will be deemed to have been received on the second working day after posting or, if the addressee is overseas, on the fifth working day after posting. Any notice sent by fax or served personally will be deemed to be delivered on the first working day following despatch.

11 ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS

The following provisions of this clause 11 shall apply only if you are acting for the purposes of your business.

11.1 Limitation of Liability

Subject to clause 6, we shall not be liable, whether in tort (including for negligence) or breach of statutory duty, contract, misrepresentation or otherwise for any:

- 11.1.1 loss of profits, loss of business, depletion of goodwill and/or similar losses, loss of anticipated savings, loss of goods, loss of contract, loss of use, loss of corruption of data or information; or
- 11.1.2 any special, indirect, consequential or pure economic loss, costs, damages, charges or expenses.

11.2 Severability

11.3 Force majeure

We shall have no liability to you if we are prevented from, or delayed in performing, our obligations under these Terms and Conditions or from carrying on our business by acts, events, omissions or accidents beyond our reasonable control, including (without limitation) strikes, lock-outs or other industrial disputes (whether involving our workforce or the workforce of any other party), failure of a utility service or transport network, act of God, war, riot, civil commotion, malicious damage, compliance with any law or governmental order, rule, regulation or direction, accident, breakdown of plant or machinery, fire, flood, storm or default of suppliers or subcontractors.

11.4 Waiver

- 11.4.1 A waiver of any right under these Terms and Conditions is only effective if it is in writing and it applies only to the circumstances for which it is given. No failure or delay by a party in exercising any right or remedy under these Terms and Conditions or by law shall constitute a waiver of that (or any other) right or remedy, nor preclude or restrict its further exercise. No single or partial exercise of such right or remedy shall preclude or restrict the further exercise of that (or any other) right or remedy.
- 11.4.2 Unless specifically provided otherwise, rights arising under these Terms and Conditions are cumulative and do not exclude rights provided by law.

11.5 Law and Jurisdiction

- 11.5.1 These Terms and Conditions and any dispute or claim arising out of or in connection with them or their subject matter, shall be governed by, and construed in accordance with, the law of England and Wales.
- 11.5.2 The parties irrevocably agree that the courts of England and Wales shall have exclusive jurisdiction to settle any dispute or claim that arises out of, or in connection with, Terms and Conditions or their subject matter.
