## A NEW ANGEVIN PENNY



The Anarchy, Baronial Magnates, Unattributed, (c. 1140-1155), Penny, in the style of Henry I (BMC XV), Uncertain South-Western Mint, Bristol [?], crowned bust facing, wearing segmented drapery with trio of pellets in spaces of hem, vestigial traces of inner 'toothed' border and legend in the style of Stephen, rev. At present no parallel can be found across the Angevin corpus for this reverse 'roundel' design, and its legend whilst vestigial remains tantalising obscure. Stylistically however it is a close parallel for the late facing issues of Henry I and must therefore be considered with the subvarieties of Baronial Magnate issues emanating from around the country in the chaotic middle decades of the 12th Century, albeit as a previously unrecorded type. A tentative further connection could be made to the wider series of specie produced in the name of Henry of Anjou, the future King Henry II for whom a number of coins are now known also clearly modelled on the same BMC XV type. Interestingly those predominantly reuse the reverse die for inspiration, where clearly this is an entirely separate and free artistic design. The South Western find spot is a further diagnostic clue, particularly for our historical record of the Anarchy.

In 1147, Henry, Count of Anjou returned to England aged fourteen. His retinue included his immediate household and a few mercenaries, and upon landing in England, he immediately moved on Wiltshire. Despite initial panic, his expedition had little success, with Henry finding himself unable to pay his forces and also unable to return to Normandy. Neither his mother nor his uncle were prepared to support him, but surprisingly, King Stephen himself would pay his aggressor's outstanding wages and thereby allow him to withdraw from England with dignity.

On Thursday afternoon William Body, in the employ of Mr. W B Berry, who is carrying out alterations, was digging down the ceiling close to a large beam, when his hammer struck something. Body put his hand over the beam to ascertain what it was, and pulled out a large leather bag. A number of coins fell out of it. Boddy immediately gave information of the discovery. The coins about the room were collected and placed in the bag with the rest, and removed to the vestry below, and the vicar (Prebendary Smith) was sent for. The bag was found to contain many hundreds of silver coins, the dates of some being as far back as 1472 and various dates up to nearly 1700. The coins consist of sixpences, shillings, florins and crowns [sic], large numbers of which are in an excellent state of preservation; some of the crowns are in almost perfect condition. The coins were handed over by the vicar to the chaplain (Rev. E. Knight), who immediately deposited them at the Devon and Cornwall Bank. The coins found weighed over 20lbs. and the number is estimated at nearly a thousand. Later on, Mr. Berry made another search of the room, and amongst the debris 52 more coins were picked up, many being considered of great value. (West Somerset Free Press, 17 October 1896, refers.)

H A Grueber, in documenting the find for the Numismatic Chronicle in 1897 (pp. 159-172), made several important observations. The first being at least 1,884 coins were recovered from the vestry, of which only 16 were Hammered Halfcrowns of Charles II. Critically all of this issue are worn, suggesting the trove must have been amassed in a private capacity from around 1665 until final deposition shortly after 1683. Around 120 coins were retained by the British Museum with some 1,700 returned to the finders. In May 1897 it was elected that the coins should be offered at public auction and be catalogued by Major Montague.

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

### Bidding as Principal

When making a bid (whether such bids are made in person or by way of telephone bids operated by Spink, commission or online or email bids), you will be deemed to be acting as principal and will be accepting personal liability, unless it has been agreed in writing, at the time of registration, that you are acting as agent on behalf of a third party buyer acceptable to us.

### Commission Bids

If you give us instructions to bid on your behalf, by using the form provided in our catalogues or via our website, we shall use reasonable endeavours to do so, provided these instructions are received not later than 24 hours before the auction. If we receive commission bids on a particular Lot for identical amounts, and at auction these bids are the highest bids for the Lot, it will be sold to the person whose bid was received first. Commission bids are undertaken subject to other commitments at the time of the sale, and the conduct of the auction may be such that we are unable to bid as requested. Since this is undertaken as a free service to prospective buyers on the terms stated, we cannot accept liability for failure to make a commission bid. You should therefore always attend personally if you wish to be certain of bidding.

### 4.5 On-line Bidding

We offer internet services as a convenience to our clients. We will not be responsible for errors or failures to execute bids placed on the internet, including, without limitation, errors or failures caused by (i) a loss of internet connection by either party for whatever reason; (ii) a breakdown or problems with the online bidding software and/or (iii) a breakdown or problems with your internet connection, computer or system. Execution of on-line internet bids on www.spink.com and Spink Live is a free service undertaken subject to other commitments at the time of the auction and we do not accept liability for failing to execute an online internet bid or for errors or omissions in connection with this activity.

### 4.6 Telephone Bids

If you make arrangements with us not less than 24 hours before the sale, we shall use reasonable endeavours to contact you to enable you to participate in bidding by telephone, but in no circumstances will we be liable to either the Seller or you as a result of failure to do so.

### 4.7 Currency Converter

- 5.3.3 To apply for a refund of any VAT paid, the proof of export certificate must be sent to our Shipping Department clearly marked 'VAT Refund' within 3 months of the date of sale. No payment will be made where the total amount of VAT refundable is less than £50 and Spink will charge £50 for each refund processed.
- 5.3.4 Where a Lot is included within the Margin Scheme and Auctioneers' Scheme and evidence of export from the UK is produced within 3 months of the date of sale, the VAT on Buyer's Premium may be refunded.
- 5.3.5 Where the Lot is marked as a Daggered (†) Lot the VAT charged on the Hammer Price may be refunded where evidence of export from the UK is produced within 3 months of the date of sale. ### 5.4 Payment

- 5.4.1 You must provide us with your full name and permanent address and, if so requested, details of the bank from which any payments to us will be made. You are requested to contact us by telephone or in person as soon as possible after the auction to obtain details of the outcome of your bids to avoid incurring charges for late payment.

#### 5.8 Packing and handling

#### 5.9 Recommended packers and shippers

If required our shipping department may arrange shipment as your agent. Although we may suggest carriers if specifically requested, our suggestions are made on the basis of our general experience of such parties in the past and we are not responsible to any person to whom we have made a recommendation for the acts or omissions of the third parties concerned.

#### 5.10 Remedies for non-payment or failure to collect purchases

- 5.10.1 If you fail to make payment within seven days of your stipulated payment date set out in your invoice, we shall be entitled to exercise one or more of the following rights or remedies:
  - 5.10.1.1 to charge interest at the rate of 2% per month compound interest, calculated on a daily basis, from the date the full amount is due;
  - 5.10.1.2 to set off against any amounts which the Spink Group may owe you in any other transaction the outstanding amount remaining unpaid by you;

- 5.12.4 Unless otherwise agreed by us in writing, the fact that you wish to apply for an export licence does not affect your obligation to make payment within seven days nor our right to charge interest on late payment.
- 5.12.5 If you request that we apply for an export licence on your behalf, we shall be entitled to recover from you our disbursements and out of pocket expenses in relation to such application, together with any relevant VAT.

- 5.13.2 In no circumstances shall we be required to pay you any more than the amount paid by you for the Lot concerned and you shall have no claim for interest.
- 5.13.3 The benefit of this guarantee is not capable of being transferred, and is solely for the benefit of the person to whom the original invoice was made out by us in respect of the Lot when sold and who, since the sale, has remained the owner of the Lot without disposing of any interest in it to any third party.
- 5.13.4 We shall be entitled to rely on any scientific or other process to establish that the Lot is not a Forgery, whether or not such process was used or in use at the date of the auction.

#### 6 LIABILITY

- 6.1 death or personal injury resulting from negligence; or
- 6.2 any damage or liability incurred by you as a result of our fraud or fraudulent misrepresentation.

- 7.1 We will use the personal information you provide to us as set out in our privacy notice (available at https://spink.com/privacy-policy) and in particular to:
  - 7.1.1 process the bids you make on Lots (whether successful or otherwise) and other auction related services we provide;
  - otherwise) and other auction related services we provide; 7.1.2 process your payment relating to a successful purchase of a Lot;

- 11.1.1 loss of profits, loss of business, depletion of goodwill and/or similar losses, loss of anticipated savings, loss of goods, loss of contract, loss of use, loss of corruption of data or information; or
- 11.1.2 any special, indirect, consequential or pure economic loss, costs, damages, charges or expenses.

#### 11.2 Severability



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## Jean-Marie Vanmeerbeeck:

a gentleman collector 'pur sang'



Jean-Marie Vanmeerbeeck was born in Antwerp on 11 November 1924. He would spend most of his life in the Flemish capital, largely in the employ of the international shipping industry. At a still tender age, Jean-Marie would lose his father to the debilitating effects of mustard gas poisoning, bringing into sharp relief the prolonged suffering of 'Belgian volunteers' even decades after Armistice Day. The juxtaposition of the Great War and Jean-Marie's birth would forever after create a day of intense emotions that would prove formative throughout the life of the latter.

The cessation of Second War hostilities allowed Jean-Marie to travel to post-war London. An Anglophile was instantly born, fully embracing of the style, the culture and the quirks of this intoxicating city. The history obliterated by ten years and two

bloody conflicts in his native Flanders must have seemed a world removed from the ageing edifices surviving on virtually every London street corner. Perhaps the recent 'Blitz renovations' became a little too synonymous with home. In any case, the natural human instinct for collecting blossomed, materialising in a discipline of 'beauty and history' within the field of numismatics. As so many starting out, this creative 'addiction' was subsidised by personal savings. This initial seed would through time and careful consideration flower into an unique life's work over the next six decades.

'Life imitates art' has never been more true of a cabinet than with Jean-Marie's collection. Family is our core theme, through which interpersonal relationships play out across the pages of his catalogue, as they did over time long since past. To each 'chapter' a new family tree can added, from the Ancient World which gave us the very medium of coinage and inspired the earliest native 'British' designs, to the adopted heritage or the irrepressible House of Tudor, before a final journey back to his homeland and the Burgundian House of Dampierre. Another of Jean-Marie's beloved anglicisms is especially apt here: 'history repeats itself'. As England influenced his cabinet trays and even his wardrobe, his Flandrian 14th Century forebear endured the overlordship of Edward III, and the obligation to support the economical vital English wool trade.

The fresh intrigue generated from these 'numismatic family trees' renders these familiar series now surprisingly alien, much like the enigmatic Vanmeerbeeck name prior to today. Seldom outside the hallowed halls of a museum can such provocation be wrought on the collecting mindset. It is sincerely hoped that this catalogue will serve as a lasting legacy to Jean-Marie Vanmeerbeeck's unwavering dedication to the hobby, and indeed to the curation of a truly unique artistic and numismatic cabinet that will continue to challenge those most inclined for years to come.

As his daughter, I recall his endless patience in the pursuit of the perfect specimen, particularly for the 'Boy King' issues of King Edward VI. I distinctly remember his quest for lots 130 and 132, and his undeniable ecstasy at securing them. That personal affinity with every coin, I feel as keenly today even fifteen years after his passing, as I did during his lifetime, and can still remember his reasoning for almost every purchase. As a result, I trust you will forgive me for wishing to retain a part of his collection that resonates most profoundly; one that champions the beauty of 'pocket-sized' Imperial female portraiture in the Roman world. These striking Severan series have been illustrated on the inside back cover of this catalogue for all to enjoy, but for me to enjoy for a while longer!



I find it poetic that the family ties that proved so strong in the formation of this collection have been replicated at this moment of sale through consultation with Spink, and dedicated expertise of another parent-child combination in Michael and Gregory.

Thank you Dad for your passion and the beauty of your collection that also guided my life.

# Ancient World

Few coins will ever transcend their original purpose, or be viewed as anything more than the day-to-day workhorses of their economic epoch. However our earliest surviving coinage emanating from Greece and Asia Minor would come to serve as the prototype for imitations in the pockets of Gallic mercenaries who returned with them to Western Europe in the 4th Century BC. What these early migrants could not have predicted however, was the subsequent impact of their own Macedonian salaries on the design of local currency; the shared iconography of which would perpetuate on Gallo-Belgic issues and eventually native British coinage until the Claudian invasion of AD 43. To put this in context, it would be the equivalent of our present Queen adopting a Jacobean ruff in celebration of her forthcoming Platinum Jubilee!

The distinctive laurel wreath worn by Apollo on the obverse of the Macedonian Stater would gain independent symbolicsm in the Ancient World, especially following its popularisation by dictator Julius Caesar to mask his thinning hairline in the 1st Century BC. Prior to this, the garnish was worn following a triumph, whether that be a running race at Olympia or after a successful Roman military campaign. In time it would become synonymous with Imperial status as testified by our emphatic portrait of Hadrian, who was not the first Emperor to visit Britain, but remains the most famous guest following his fortification of the Northern territories from AD 122.





Coinage is often our most insightful window into the rule of short-lived primates. This is especially true in the largely anepigraphic epoch of prehistory and again during the English 'Dark Ages'. Thanks to the flight of a wayward arrow on the 14 October 1066, the same is also true for Harold II Godwinesson. Familiar to most art scholars from the Bayeux tapestry, historians will perhaps know him better thanks to the ignominy of being 'the last Anglo-Saxon King of England'. Having vanquished a Viking force at Stamford Bridge, the furious march of his battle-weary army southwards and the subsequent ill-discipline of a shield wall would ultimately cost Harold dear. Both his kingdom and his life would fall after just 10 months. His numismatic legacy is remembered by only one issue, emblazoned with a Latin message – PAX, which like his Roman forebears had intended to be a call for Peace in a time of transition and internecine unrest, but in hindsight endures as a pathetically ironic plea.

The Gold Noble is one of the great success stories of English numismatics. Introduced during the reign of Edward III, it provides an artistic masterclass in aesthetic and technical 'High Medieval' design. Through a magnificent blend of Gothic-lombardic and Romano-classical letter forms, the coin is an holistic demonstration of the power, grandeur and indeed piety of the depicted Plantagenet monarch; a veritable 'Holy Trinity' of kingship in which the English identity and hegemonic pretentions are emblazoned for all to witness. Its economic inception is well documented, but bears repetition in the context of the Vanmeerbeeck cabinet.

Edward's 'Pre-Treaty' coinage is especially well-known, however his claim to the French throne takes on renewed meaning when considered alongside the specie of Louis II of Male, whose father had been killed at the Battle of Crécy by the game-changing deployment of the English longbow army.

The iconography of the Noble is by its nature anti-French and deliberately provocative in its celebration of Edward's naval victory in the inlet between Zeeland and West Flanders in June 1340. Despite encountering a force at Sluys harbour perhaps twice as large as his own, Edward's squadron benefited from favourable tidal and wind conditions to out flank and ultimately capture or 'defeat in detail' the majority of the assembled French fleet. Whilst indecisive in the context of the Hundred Year's War, the engagement ensured supremacy of the Channel passed albeit temporarily into Edward's hands and from which an English foothold in continental Europe would emerge again.

# Henry VI (1422-1461)

#### Anglo-Gallic

The victory at Azincourt has long been held in the national annals as an English triumph 'against overwhelming military odds'. In recent times, the impact of weather conditions, battlefield terrain and a deeper appreciation of the chivalric rules of engagement have helped revise the narrative to that more familiar in European circles. In reality, the battle was a disaster for the French ruling nobility, and was further compounded by the premature death of the King Henry V in 1422. In consequence both England and France were now ruled by a 10.5 month old infant who by blood was maternally related to King Charles VI, an infamous monarch known better by his two opposing epithets: 'the beloved' and latterly 'the Mad'. His paranoia about being made of glass may also explain the mental disturbances afflicting Henry VI's later life that culminated in the bloody civil war poetically described as the 'Wars of the Roses'.

Numismatics provides us key insight into this remarkable period of Anglo-Gallic shared rule, creatively imagined by the touching shields of the French and English courts. In truth, the situation was vastly more complex, as the French ruling class had fractured between the Armagnac and Burgundian factions. The latter would come to be allied with English interests; both pursuing a policy of subjugation of rebellious factions across the fragmented French kingdom. This policy culminated in the Siege of Orleans in 1429, whereupon a relief army sent by the Dauphin would famously distinguish itself by the lifting of the siege after only nine days. Its figurehead - a lowly peasant's daughter - would gain immortality. Famed for her own piety, the overt Christian imagery in this age of Joan of Arc, is both striking and enlightening, especially in the issue from Dijon, which at the time sat on the frontier of Frankish civil war hostilities.

# The House of Tudor

History can rarely be defined by straight lines or specific dates – that is until one considers the seismic events at Bosworth Field in August 1485. The totemic upheaval of the Plantagenet ruling class by a young pretender with an highly dubious personal claim to the English crown must be one of the most defining events in the island's history. For the loser, an inglorious burial beneath a car park. For the winner, the keys to the kingdom and the opportunity to overhaul her coinage. Although tentative at first, the Henrician image ultimately redefines monarchy in the eyes of its most receptive audience. Henry literally turns away from the facing portrait style that was as familiar to Edward I as it was his predecessor Richard III. Alongside the development of the profile coinage within his silver specie, Henry also initiates the production of large denomination gold coinages, evidently to curry favour with every strata of English society. The coup de grace of this numismatic transformation is the replacement of the long cross and twelve pellets, perhaps representative of the Apostles with his adorned Royal shield. No longer a statement of King and Church, but the unified House of Tudor. So effective was this Royal rebrand, that the most symbolic vestiges of Parliament, the Monarchy and the English nation itself today have their origins in his iconography.

# A Potted History of Henrician Coinage

#### Second Coinage

History can surprise as often as it can deceive, especially when one relies too heavily on a solitary source. Tradition would paint Henry VIII as a tyrannical megalomaniac, forever suspicious of his wives, and never satiated by food or beverage. The alarming disconnect between general belief and fact is never more clearly witnessed than across the three phases of his own coinage. His first coinage remains astonishingly indistinct from his father's last. However the transition into his second and third coinage is both stark and emotive. Thomas Wolsey's recoinage of 1526 provides us an important waypoint in Henry's reign, with his silver coinage respectfully reimagined with youthful facial features and playfully 'fluffy' hair. His gold coinage sits in contrast however, never showing the King's likeness and instead opting from the crowned Tudor rose and Royal shield. A famous lothario, the changes in the Royal favour and Queen consort played out as much at Hampton Court as it would in people's pockets. The fateful romances of Aragon, Boleyn, Seymour and Howard are navigated through this period which but for the temporary appearance of their respective cyphers would leave this coinage frustratingly undateable - unlike the man himself!



#### Third Coinage

Just occasionally however history and numismatics align in perfect harmony. The most enduring image of any English monarch is to be found in the emphatic portrait of King Henry VIII by Hans Holbein (1537) - a full-length likeness as notable for its splendour, as it is for the preposterous size of the regal codpiece. It is in essence the total package of the Royal form, addressing every aspect of Kingship from individual power, to luxury and of course the importance of succession. In Henry's desperate pursuit of a male heir he would burn through six wives, the Catholic Church and ultimately his own health. His corpulent appearance of his third and last coinage could be interpreted no more as an expression of Royal grandeur as it could be a stark reminder of the horrendous toll absolute power exerts on the body of a once vibrant, athletic youth.

Henry's personal greed would also directly contribute to the paucity of surviving coins bearing this likeness, or at least those Testoons found in so presentable as the Vanmeerbeeck example. Notoriously 'soft' in appearance and often struck with a remarkable lack of care, the subterfuge of Henry's monetary debasement witnessed in the final three years of his life gave rise to a derogatory nickname - 'Old Copper Nose'. Fortunately for numismatists the remarkable preservation of this example has been noteworthy ever since its first appearance on St George's Day, 1986, or in Henrician terms, the 477th Anniversary of his accession!

### Edward VI (1547-1553)

Much like his father, Edward's coinage is punctuated by artistic evolutions, albeit in his case they are reflective of the political circumstances dictating his short reign. Inheriting the throne at the tender age of nine ensured the adoption of a Regent for his Royal council. Edward Seymour, 1st Duke of Somerset would last just two years into his reign, with his fall from grace marked with a key transition in the design of Edward's specie. His first coins would closely mirrored the last of his father's, with the earliest of these issues being simply 'posthumous' strikings of his predecessor's types. The second period is more reflective of Edward's growing frustration with court and his perceived immaturity. The bare head portrait would last all of four months before being rapidly upgraded to the crowned portrait which would remain in use until the final recoinage of 1551. It is noteworthy that Edward's Royal titles are also transposed for the two phases of his second coinage with the earlier 'baby face' and 'erroneous placement' being swiftly replaced by an armoured depiction of a young King as if 'in waiting'. This military prowess would be tested first-hand just months later during Kett's Rebellion over land enclosures in Norfolk.

### The Edwardian Revolution of 1551

The Third Period is the most recognisable of Edward's coinage, as well as being his most influential contribution to the wider English economy. The development of the Testoon coinage under his father and grandfather would transition into the regular production of a new coin - the Shilling, to be further supported a new Crown and Halfcrown, all of which would be struck once more in fine silver. The adoption of marks of value and indeed in the case of the biggest issues Arabic numerals for years of production are revolutionary for English specie, even though not all of his additions would become regularly adopted until the Commonwealth period.

Nevertheless, the return of the facing portrait like that seen in the last period of Henry VIII's rule provides a final artistic flourish to his reign, and unbeknownst to him, also the last time such a style would be seen on a silver currency coin in England. The reason is purely practical, with the lifespan of a circulating coin significantly lengthened by a profile image of the monarch. In consequence, and excluding the largest gold specie, this coinage represents the final time a broad stretch of English population could make direct eye contact with their King on a coin. Curiously this feature would become well noted by Shakespeare as this coin became an ideal playing device for the parlour drinking game 'Shove Ha'penny'. John Taylor, the 'water-poet' would pen the poem overleaf in his 1621 work: 'A Shilling or the Travailes of Twelve-pence'

Much like her half-brother, the pursuit of a wholesome portrait of Queen Mary is an exceptional challenge for numismatists, and is further compounded by the 'tit-fortat' defacement of Royal portraiture by Catholic or Protestant sympathisers. Trace evidence of this religious turmoil may be found behind the portrait of our present specimen, which remains as an otherwise extraordinary survivor of an age of English 'damnatio memoriae'. A more striking feature of the coin is to be found in the unique legend VERITAS TEMPORIS FILIA - 'Truth is the Daughter of Time'. A cognizance that would ultimately become the personal motto of the 'Bloody' Queen. The chaotic deposition of appointed heir Lady Jane Grey after only nine days prior to Mary's coronation may also feed into this device: a deliberate miscommunication about who was the rightful female heir to the throne.

### Return of the Classical Bust

The neo-classical revival of the Renaissance would lap English shores throughout the 16th Century, but would not actively materialise on her coinage until the reign of James I; after the Royal baton had passed on to the House of Stuart. As will be seen in the Simon English collection immediately following this sale, the radical numismatic re-imagination of English kingship in the late 1610s was directly modelled on the Imperial style of the Roman world. This would result in the widespread depiction of laurel wreaths and drapery or cuirassing alongside the contemporary 17th Century style. Much like their Imperial forebears who had detachable wigs for their statues, fashions evidently shifted rapidly during the reign on King Charles I prompting multiple portrait redesigns in the 1620s and 1630s. However his reign is better remembered for its inglorious climax - the only monarch to be beheaded for treason against his own kingdom.

The rise of the Protectorate under Oliver Cromwell would further encourage the development of the classical style with the expertise of Frenchman Piers Blondeau combining with the native talents of Thomas Simon to produce some of those most celebrated designs in the entirety of the English specie. Political manoeuvring ensured Simon would survive the Restoration of the Monarchy in 1660, but would not prevent his famous Royal snub in favour of the Dutch Roettier brothers following a design competition of 1662. Simon would succumb to the Great Plague in 1665, but not before his late 'Petition' came to subtly influence the cruciform shields on the reverse of Carolean and all subsequent Stuart issues as will be seen on the following pages.

The transition to screw press from traditional hand manufacture would also coincide with the increasingly global outlook of the English nation. The formation of the Royal African Company under the insignia of the Elephant and Castle not only provides us with a train station on the London Underground but also an expansive corpus of gold coined directly

or indirectly as a result of this bloody human-bullion trade. Its emotive legacy would be indelibly connected to the coinage for its source would also loan the coin its name - the Guinea. Its introduction would be chequered by fluctuating bullion prices, eventually resulting in a new tariff of 21 Shillings in 1717. Although it would survive the transition of the House of Stuart to that of Orange in the bloodless coup of 1688, its production under the Hanoverians would become increasingly erratic. A series of design changes during the reign of George III provide our most populous account for the coinage, with its final production in 1813 paying for the military campaigns against Napoleon.

The arrival of Benedetto Pistrucci at the Royal Mint would help ensure the success of the Great Recoinage of 1816. A necessary economic step that would bring to an end a twodecade long spasm of local or private issued currency (such as the famous Dorrien-Magens Shilling, see lot 74 in the preceding catalogue). The Guinea had by now become an impractical currency unit in circulation and so a new denomination was devised. Borrowing its name from a coin issued by Henry VII, the new design incorporated the neo-classical with the Medieval, and the mythical patron Saint of an increasingly Imperialistic Britain. As will be seen, the nomenclature 'Sovereign' was not initially accepted despite having strong English heritage with which to satisfy an increasingly jingoistic and ever sceptical public audience. The use of the laurel wreath headdress would gradually fade during the reigns of George IV and William IV, evidently no longer needing to portray that allusion of Imperial grandeur. The welcomed accession of Queen Victoria in 1837 would also provide the rebirth of the Neo-Gothic style, never more so apparent than in the reconstruction of the Houses of Parliament from 1840, and indeed in the iconic 'Gothic' Crown issued by the Royal Mint in 1847. This immediately recognisable and enduringly popular coin is rightly celebrated as one of the most artistic coins ever conceived, with its strict original mintage of only 8,000 pieces ensuring its enduring appeal ever after, especially when so many careless Victorians did not appreciate the full meaning of 'proof' finish!





## Mediæval Flanders

The Court of Louis II of Male, Count of Nevers and Rethel (1346-1384)

Louis II of Male was born into the noble Dampierre dynasty, the son of Count Louis I of Flanders and Margaret of Burgundy, second daughter of King Philip V of France. Whilst his father had understandably adopted a pro-French policy, civil unrest would follow in the 1320s, with Louis II's own succession marked by his father's death at the Battle of Crécy in 1346. The increasing influence of King Edward in the French kingdom coincided with internal pressure from wool guilds keen to continue the lucrative Anglo-Flandrian trade. In recognition of the English king as his overlord, he would be offered the ruler's daughter Isabella. Instead he would flee to the French court and proceed to take the hand of Margaret of Brabant in marriage in 1347. The seismic shock of the Black Death sweeping Europe the following year would result in a reconciliation with the English king in 1349, permitting his return to Flanders to officially succeed his father. Relations improved further following his refusal to accept the new French king Jean II 'le Bon', some of whose coinage he would latterly imitate for his own benefit.

Following the death of his father in law, Louis II sought to claim the Duchy of Brabant from his sister-in-law Joanna. His victory at the Battle of Scheut on 17 August 1356 saw his temporary capture of the cities of Mechelen, Brussels, Antwerp and Leuven. However the combined might of Joanna, backed by Wenceslaus I of Luxembourg and Emperor Charles IV, left Louis ultimately seeking a treaty. At the Peace of Ath in 1357 he gained the Lordship of Mechelen and the city of Antwerp.

Unlike his father, Louis II sought to govern with *realpolitik*, adopting a neutral stance in the ongoing Anglo-Frankish 'Hundred Year's War'. This kept him in favour with both courts and contributed to a period of stability and prosperity in Flanders. Internally he sought to prevent the creation of rival factions, like the coalition that had plagued his father's rule before him. This he achieved with further shrewd positioning and political marriages including wedding his daughter Margaret firstly to Duke Philip I of Burgundy, and following his death from plague, a dowry of 200,000 livres to marry Philip the Bold, which took place at Saint Bavo's Abbey in Ghent on 13 June 1369.

Historians would paint Louis as a capable ruler with a weakness for the finer lifestyle. As a consequence, his county's finances would become increasingly burdened. Nevertheless ground support remained strong amongst Bruges citizens when a revolt broke out in Ghent. On a separate occasion, he relied upon the aid of his son-in-law to quell a similar rebellion. On 3 May 1382, a faction led by Philip van Artevelde succeeded in expelling Louis from Flanders after he was roundly beaten at the Battle of Beverhoutsveld. The result was overturned on 27 November at the Battle of Roosebeke when Artevelde was slain. Ghent would however remain a thorn in Louis' side until his death at Lille on 30 January 1384.





- 5.3.5 Where the Lot is marked as a Daggered (†) Lot the VAT charged on the Hammer Price may be refunded where evidence of export from the UK is produced within 3 months of the date of sale. A refund of VAT charged on the Buyer's Premium can also be made on receipt of proof of business as a collectibles dealer
- 5.3.6 Where the Lot is marked as an Omega  $(\Omega)$  Lot or an Import VAT (x) Lot and evidence of export from the UK is produced within 3 months of the date of sale, the VAT charged on both the Hammer Price and Buyer's Premium may be refunded. Where required, we can advise you on how to export such Lots as a specific form of export evidence is required. Where we advise you on the export of the Lots, please be aware that the ultimate responsibility in respect of obtaining a valid proof of export certificate will lie with you and we will not be responsible for your failure to obtain such certificate
- 5.3.7 Lot marked as Investment Gold (g) is exempt from VAT on Hammer price. A refund of VAT charged on the Buyer's Premium can be made on receipt of proof of business as a collectibles dealer and where evidence of export from the UK is produced within 3 months of the date of sale.

#### 5.4 Payment

- 5.4.1 You must provide us with your full name and permanent address and, if so requested, details of the bank from which any payments to us will be made. #### 5.10 Remedies for non-payment or failure to collect purchases

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### 'If I tell you, you'll be a wise as I am!'

Simon English was born in Derby in June 1919. An intensely private individual throughout his life, he attended technical college to gain Ordinary and Higher National Certificates; skills that would later distinguish him at the local Rolls Royce factory where he tested engines during the Second World War. Serving on the home front still provided Simon with a daily reminder of the perilous wartime conditions – his factory was of critical significance to the war effort and so gained the added protection of camouflage, barrage balloons and even anti-aircraft guns. Late in the war he was promoted to Outside Representation for Rolls Royce, covering the South of England sector. He would be posted to Worthy Down with the Fleet Air Arm, before another relocation to High Post Aerodrome near Salisbury where he tested Spitfires and attended air crashes in the vicinity.

He would meet his future wife in the early 1950s, and soon after acquire his own vehicle repair business in Hampshire. Soon followed four children and an emerging passion for history, the Roman world and by extension numismatics. Visiting the established dealerships of Spink, Seaby and Baldwin's in the aftermath of the Lockett dispersals ensured English was exposed to a varied market place alive with exceptional coins – a diet that would ultimately prove decisive in the formation of the cabinet seen in the following pages today.

One particularly influential figure was Alderman Horace Hird, who like Simon had a particular fascination for the rarities within the English Hammered Gold series. Whereas Hird preferred pyx overmarks and the reign of Elizabeth I, Simon would permit himself the latitude of high Medieval to post-Restoration gold provided both rarity and quality were met. As a result the enlightening 'Amstell Archive' used for the decoding of the Hird private treaty sales in June 1962 provides an enlightening window into the constant honing and perfection of his cabinet as and when both funds and examples allowed over the next three decades. However this was always done in the utmost secrecy and away from the prying eyes of the collecting world, and even from those who knew him best. As his family would later say of their 'lovable rogue', 'he was sometimes awkward, but very shrewd and definitely wily'.

His other favoured pastime was countryside rambles to sites of archaeological and historical interest, both home and abroad. Many family memories remain of this doting husband and father, grandfather and great grandfather from these expeditions, although the extent and quality of his 'lost collection' of coins could not be fully appreciated by them until after his death in 2013. It is the privilege of this House, along with his family, to finally share the trays from his remarkable cabinet which have been hidden for so long.

The issue of Group C Unites was the most intricate and erratic of the reign of Charles I (BNJ, 1957, pp. 341-343) and contains an unusual number of pattern, proof and 'model' strikings. The pattern for the type (North 2666) was prepared during the heart (26 June 1629 to 23 June 1630) pyx period, with the currency issues introduced early in 1631. However around the same time, the King changed his style of dress, replacing the stiff ruff "picardil" with a soft falling lace collar. A new pattern was produced (North 2667) before the end of June 1631, bearing the plume but clearly anticipating the portrait of Group D adopted after 21 June 1632. This rendered the Group C portrait almost immediately obsolete, with the design remaining in an experimental stage. However Nicholas Briot evidently executed careful 'Models' from which Tower engravers could 'conform their work together'. Schneider's identification of this die as Briot's own proof for the issue is made all the more interesting by its employment in the production of business strikings with a defective reverse die.


The proof reverse die is easily identified by the raised line which extends from the base of the mintmark to the band of the crown. Not all coins die-linked into the proof or "model" strikings are necessarily of this standard. Schneider 134 is struck from the proof obverse die combined with a normal reverse die and it is not unusual to find proof or "model" dies released for general use where they produce coins of finer than usual, but not 'prooflike', quality.





If you make arrangements with us not less than 24 hours before the sale, we shall use reasonable endeavours to contact you to enable you to participate in bidding by telephone, but in no circumstances will we be liable to either the Seller or you as a result of failure to do so.

### **Currency Converter**

At some auctions, a currency converter will be operated, based on the one month forward rates of exchange quoted to us by Barclays Bank Plc or any other appropriate rate determined by us, at opening on the date of the auction. Bidding will take place in a currency determined by us, which is usually sterling for auctions held in London. The currency converter is not always reliable, and errors may occur beyond our control either in the accuracy of the Lot number displayed on the converter, or the foreign currency equivalent of sterling bids. We shall not be liable to you for any loss suffered as a result of you following the currency converter.

# Video images

At some auctions there will be a video screen. Mistakes may occur in its operation, and we cannot be liable to you regarding either the correspondence of the image to the Lot being sold or the quality of the image as a reproduction of the original.

# **Bidding Increments**

Bidding generally opens below the low estimate and advances in the following order although the auctioneer may vary the bidding increments during the course of the auction. The normal bidding increments are:

4.10 Bidding by Spink
4.10.1 We reserve the right to bid on Lots on the Seller's behalf up to the amount of the Reserve (if any), which will never be above the low estimate printed in the auction catalogue.

4.10.2 The Spink Group reserves the right to bid on and purchase Lots as principal.

4.10.3 Lots with this symbol (∋) indicate that a party has provided Spink with an irrevocable bid on the lot that will be executed objing the sale at a value that ensures that the lot will sell. The irrevocable bidder, who may bid in excess of the irrevocable bid, will be compensated based on his bid in the event he or she is not the successful bidder or may receive a fixed fee in the event he or she is the successful bidder if the irrevocable bidder is the successful bidder, the fixed fee for providing the irrevocable bid may be netted against the irrevocable bidder's obligation to pay the full purchase price for the lot. If the irrevocable bid is not secured until after the printing of the auction catalogue, a pre-sale announcement will be made indicating that there is an irrevocable bid on the lot. bid on the lot.

If you are interested in placing an irrevocable bid in an auction, please contact us at chairmanoffice@spink.com. Typically, only some of the lots with an estimate, which must exceed £100,000 or equivalent in other currencies are open to irrevocable bids.

# 4.11 The Auctioneer's Discretion

The auctioneer has the right at his absolute discretion to refuse any bid to advance the bidding in such manner as he may decide to withdraw or divide any Lot, to combine any two or more Lots and, in the case of error or dispute, to put an item up for bidding again.

### 4.12 Successful Bid

Subject to the auctioneer's discretion, the striking of his hammer marks the acceptance of the highest bid, provided always that such bid is higher than the Reserve (where applicable), and the conclusion of a contract for sale between you and the Seller.

# 4.13 After Sale Arrangements

If you enter into any private sale agreements for any Lot with the Seller within 60 days of the auction, we, as exclusive agents of the Seller reserve the right to charge you the applicable Buyer's Premium in accordance with these Terms and Conditions, and the Seller a commission in accordance with the terms of the Seller's agreement.

# 4.14 Return of Lot

4.14.1 Once your bid has been accepted for a Lot then you are liable to pay for that Lot in accordance with these Terms and Conditions. If there are any problems with a Lot then you must notify us within 7 days of receipt of the Lot, specifying the nature of the problem. We may then request that the Lot is returned to us for inspection. Save as set out in clause 5.13, the cancellation of the sale of any Lot and the refund of the corresponding purchase price is entirely at our sole discretion. We will not normally exercise that discretion if the Lot is not received by us in the same condition that it was in at the auction date.

4.14.2 No lot may be returned on account of condition if the condition was stated by a third party grading company (including, but not limited to PCGS, NGC, ANACS, ICG, PMG, WBG, Legacy Currency Grading).

### AFTER THE AUCTION

#### Buyer's Premium and other charges

In addition to the Hammer Price, you must pay us the Buyer's Premium at a rate of 20% of the final Hammer price of each lot, postage charge and a fee for paying by card.

#### Value Added Tax

Other than in respect of Zero-rated Lots (o) VAT is chargeable on the Hammer price and the Buyer's premium of daggered (†) and ( $\Omega$ ) lots at the standard rate (currently 20%), and on lots marked (x) at the reduced rate (currently 5% on the Hammer price and 20% on the Buyer's premium). VAT on Margin scheme lots (identified by the absence of any VAT symbol next to the lot number) is payable at 20% on the Buyer's premium only.

### VAT Refunds - Buyers from outside the UK

#### General

- 5.3.1 As we remain liable to account for VAT on all Lots unless they have been exported outside the UK within 3 months of the date of sale, you will generally be asked to deposit all amounts of VAT invoiced. However, if a Spink nominated shipper is instructed, then any refundable VAT will not be collected. In all other cases credits will be made when proof of export is provided. If you export the Lot outside the UK yourself you must obtain shipping documents from the Shipping Department for which a charge of £50 will be
- 5.3.2 If you export the Lot you must return the valid proof of export certificate to us within 3 months of the date of sale. If you fail to return the proof of export certificate to us within such period and you have not already accounted to us for the VAT, you will be liable to us for the full amount of the VAT due on such Lot and we shall be entitled to invoice you for this sum.
- 5.3.3 To apply for a refund of any VAT paid, the proof of export certificate must be sent to our Shipping Department clearly marked 'VAT Refund' within 3 months of the date of sale. No payment will be made where the total amount of VAT refundable is less than £50 and Spink will charge £50 for each refund processed.
- 5.3.4 Where a Lot is included within the Margin Scheme and Auctioneers' Scheme and evidence of export from the UK is produced within 3 months of the date of sale, the VAT on Buyer's Premium may be refunded.
- 5.3.5 Where the Lot is marked as a Daggered (†) Lot the VAT charged on the Hammer Price may be refunded where evidence of export from the UK is produced within 3 months of the date of sale. A refund of VAT charged on the Buyer's Premium can also be made on receipt of proof of business as a collectibles dealer
- 5.3.6 Where the Lot is marked as an Omega  $(\Omega)$  Lot or an Import VAT (x) Lot and evidence of export from the UK is produced within 3 months of the date of sale, the VAT charged on both the Hammer Price and Buyer's Premium may be refunded. Where required, we can advise you on how to export such Lots as a specific form of export evidence is required. Where we advise you on the export of the Lots, please be aware that the ultimate responsibility in respect of obtaining a valid proof of export certificate will lie with you and we will not be responsible for your failure to obtain such certificate
- 5.3.7 Lot marked as Investment Gold (g) is exempt from VAT on Hammer price. A refund of VAT charged on the Buyer's Premium can be made on receipt of proof of business as a collectibles dealer and where evidence of export from the UK is produced within 3 months of the date of sale.

#### 5.4 Payment

- 5.4.1 You must provide us with your full name and permanent address and, if so requested, details of the bank from which any payments to us will be made. You must pay the full amount due (comprising the Hammer Price, the Buyer's Premium and any applicable VAT) within seven days after the date of the sale. This applies even if you wish to export the Lot and an export licence is (or may be) required.
- 5.4.2 You will not acquire title to the Lot until all amounts due have been paid in full. This includes instances where special arrangements were made for release of Lot prior to full settlement.
- 5.4.3 Payment should be made in sterling by one of the following
  - Direct bank transfer to our account details of which are set out on the invoice. All bank charges shall be met by you. Please ensure that your client number is noted on the transfer
  - By cheque or bank draft made payable to Spink and Son Ltd By cheque or bank draft made payable to Spink and Son Ltd and sent to Spink at 69 Southampton Row, Bloomsbury, London WC1B 4ET. Please note that the processing charges for payments made by cheques or bank drafts drawn on a non-U.K bank shall be met by you. Please ensure that the remittance slip printed at the bottom of the invoice is enclosed with your payment.

- (iii) By Visa or Mastercard. All Corporate cards regardless of origin and Consumer debit and credit cards issued outside the UK are subject to a fee of 3%. For all card payments there are limits to the amounts we will accept depending on the type of card being used and whether or not the cardholder is present.
- 5.4.4 Payments should be made by the registered buyer and not by third parties, unless it has been agreed at the time of registration that you are acting as an agent on behalf of a third party.

#### 5.5 Invoices

Invoices may consist of one or more pages and will show: Zero rated Lots (o); no symbol Lots sold under the Margin Scheme and Auctioneers' Scheme; Lots marked (g) special scheme Investment Gold; Daggered Lots (†), imported Lots marked (x) and ( $\Omega$ ).

#### 5.6 Collection of Purchases

- 5.6.1 Unless specifically agreed to the contrary, we shall retain lots purchased until all amounts due to us, or to the Spink Group, have been paid in full. Buyers will be required to pay for their lots when they wish to take possession of the same, which must be within 7 days of the date of the sale, unless prior arrangements have been made with Spink. Without prior agreement, lots will not be released until cleared funds are received with regard to payments made by cheque.
- 5.6.2 Unless we notify you to the contrary, items retained by us will be covered in accordance with our policy which is available for inspection at our offices from the date of sale for a period of seven days or until the time of collection, whichever is sooner. After seven days or from the time of collection, whichever is the earlier, the Lot will be entirely at your risk.
- 5.6.3 Our policy will not cover and we are unable to accept responsibility for damage caused by woodworm, changes in atmospheric conditions or acts of terrorism.

#### 5.7 Notification

We are not able to notify successful bidders by telephone. While Invoices are sent out by email or mail after the auction we do not accept responsibility for notifying you of the result of your bid. You are requested to contact us by telephone or in person as soon as possible after the auction to obtain details of the outcome of your bids to avoid incurring charges for late payment.

# 5.8 Packing and handling

- 5.8.1 We shall use all reasonable endeavours to take care when handling and packing a purchased Lot but remind you that after seven days or from the time of collection, whichever is sooner, the Lot is entirely at your risk. Our postage charges are set out at the back of the catalogue.
- 5.8.2 It is the responsibility of the Buyer to be aware of any Import Duties that may be incurred upon importation to the final destination. Spink will not accept return of any package in order to avoid these duties. The onus is also on the Buyer to be aware of any Customs import restrictions that prohibit the importation of certain collectibles. Spink will not accept return of the Lot(s) under these circumstances. Spink will not accept responsibility for Lot(s) seized or destroyed by Customs.
- 5.8.3 If the Buyer requires delivery of the Lot to an address other than the invoice address this will be carried out at the discretion of Spink.

# 5.9 Recommended packers and shippers

If required our shipping department may arrange shipment as your agent. Although we may suggest carriers if specifically requested, our suggestions are made on the basis of our general experience of such parties in the past and we are not responsible to any person to whom we have made a recommendation for the acts or omissions of the third parties concerned.

# 5.10 Remedies for non-payment or failure to collect purchases

- 5.10.1 If you fail to make payment within seven days of your stipulated payment date set out in your invoice, we shall be entitled to exercise one or more of the following rights or remedies:
  - 5.10.1.1 to charge interest at the rate of 2% per month compound interest, calculated on a daily basis, from the date the full amount is due;
  - 5.10.1.2 to set off against any amounts which the Spink Group may owe you in any other transaction the outstanding amount remaining unpaid by you;
  - 5.10.1.3 we may keep hold of all or some of your Lots or other property in the possession of the Spink Group until you have paid all the amounts you owe us or the Spink Group, even if the unpaid amounts do not relate to those Lots or other property. Following fourteen days' notice to you of the amount outstanding and remaining unpaid, the Spink Group shall have the right to arrange the sale of such Lots or other property. We shall apply the proceeds in discharge of the amount outstanding to us or the Spink Group, and pay any balance to you;
  - 5.10.1.4 where several amounts are owed by you to the Spink Group in respect of different transactions, to apply any amount paid to discharge any amount owed in respect of any particular transaction, whether or not you so direct;
  - 5.10.1.5 to reject at any future auction any bids made by you or on your behalf or obtain a deposit from you before accepting any bids.
- 5.10.2 If you fail to make payment within thirty-five days, we shall in addition be entitled:
  - 5.10.2.1 to cancel the sale of the Lot or any other item sold to you at the same or any other auction;

- 5.10.2.2 to arrange a resale of the Lot, publicly or privately, and, if this results in a lower price being obtained, claim the balance from you together with all reasonable costs including a 20% seller's commission, expenses, damages, legal fees, commissions and premiums of whatever kind associated with both sales or otherwise, incurred in connection with your failure to make payment:
- 5.10.2.3 when reselling the Lot, place a notice in our catalogue stating that you successfully purchased the Lot at auction but have subsequently failed to pay the Hammer Price of the Lot; or
- 5.10.2.4 take any other appropriate action as we deem fit.
- 5.10.3 If you fail to collect within fourteen days after the sale, whether or not payment has been made, you will be required
  - 5.10.3.1 to pay a storage charge of £2 per item per day plus any additional handling cost that may apply.
  - 5.10.3.2 you will not be entitled to collect the Lot until all outstanding charges are met, together with payment of all other amounts due to us.

### 5.11 Use of Default Information

If you fail to make payment for a Lot in accordance with these Terms and Conditions:

- 5.11.1 we reserve the right to refuse you the right to make bids for any future auction irrespective of whether previous defaults have been settled; and
- 5.11.2 you acknowledge that we may (as necessary for our legitimate interests those of other auctioneers and live bidding platforms in referencing customers and avoiding customer defaults) disclose details of such default to other auctioneers and live bidding platforms, which will include your name, address, nature of the default and the date of the default.

Auctioneers or live bidding platforms who receive details of the default may rely on such information when deciding whether to enter into a transaction with you in the future.

#### 5.12 Export Licence

- 5.12.1 If required we can, at our discretion, advise you on the detailed provisions of the export licensing regulations. Where we advise you in relation to export licensing regulations the ultimate responsibility in respect of any export will lie with you and we will not be responsible for your failure to apply for any necessary licences.
- 5.12.2 If the Lot is going to be hand carried by you, you may be required to produce a valid export licence to us or sign a waiver document stating that a licence will be applied for.
- 5.12.3 You should always check whether an export licence is required before exporting. Export licences are usually obtained within two or three weeks but delays can occur.
- 5.12.4 Unless otherwise agreed by us in writing, the fact that you wish to apply for an export licence does not affect your obligation to make payment within seven days nor our right to charge interest on late payment.
- 5.12.5 If you request that we apply for an export licence on your behalf, we shall be entitled to recover from you our disbursements and out of pocket expenses in relation to such application, together with any relevant VAT.
- 5.12.6 We will not be obliged to rescind a sale nor to refund any interest or other expenses incurred by you where payment is made by you despite the fact that an export licence is required.

## 5.13 Refund in the case of Forgery

- 5.13.1 A sale will be cancelled, and the amount paid refunded to you if a Lot (other than a miscellaneous item not described in the catalogue) sold by us proves to have been a Forgery. We shall not however be obliged to refund any amounts if either (a) the catalogue description or saleroom notice at the auction date corresponded to the generally accepted opinion of scholars or experts at that time, or fairly indicated that there was a conflict of opinions, or (b) it can be demonstrated that the Lot is a Forgery only by means of either a scientific process not generally accepted for use until after publication of the catalogue or a process which at the date of the auction was unreasonably expensive or impracticable or likely to have caused damage to the Lot. Furthermore, you should note that this refund can be obtained only if the following conditions are met:
  - 5.13.1.1 you must notify us in writing, within seven days of the receipt of the Lot(s), that in your view the Lot concerned is a Forgery:
  - 5.13.1.2 you must then return the item to us within fourteen days from receipt of the Lot(s), in the same condition as at the auction date; and
  - 5.13.1.3 as soon as possible following return of the Lot, you must produce evidence satisfactory to us that the Lot is a Forgery and that you are able to transfer good title to us, free from any third party claims.
  - 5.13.1.4 you must provide to us all evidence obtained by you that a Lot is a Forgery no later than 7 days after you receive such evidence.
- 5.13.2 In no circumstances shall we be required to pay you any more than the amount paid by you for the Lot concerned and you shall have no claim for interest.
- 5.13.3 The benefit of this guarantee is not capable of being transferred, and is solely for the benefit of the person to whom the original invoice was made out by us in respect of the Lot when sold and who, since the sale, has remained the owner of the Lot without disposing of any interest in it to any third party.
- 5.13.4 We shall be entitled to rely on any scientific or other process to establish that the Lot is not a Forgery, whether or not such process was used or in use at the date of the auction.

#### 6 LIABILITY

Nothing in these Terms and Conditions limits or excludes our liability for:

- 6.1 death or personal injury resulting from negligence; or
- 6.2 any damage or liability incurred by you as a result of our fraud or fraudulent misrepresentation.

#### 7 USE OF YOUR PERSONAL INFORMATION

- 7.1 We will use the personal information you provide to us as set out in our privacy notice (available at https://spink.com/privacy-policy) and in particular to:
  - 7.1.1 process the bids you make on Lots (whether successful or otherwise) and other auction related services we provide;
  - 7.1.2 process your payment relating to a successful purchase of a Lot;
  - 7.1.3 arrange for delivery of any Lot you purchase, which will include passing your details to shipping providers and, on overseas deliveries, to customs where they make enquiries regarding the Lot;
  - 7.1.4 inform you about similar products or services that we provide, but you may stop receiving these at any time by contacting us.
- 7.2 In accordance with clause 4.2, we may pass your information to credit reference agencies in order to obtain credit checks from them, and they may keep a record of any search that they do.
- 7.3 In accordance with clause 5.11, where you default on making payment for a Lot in accordance with these terms and conditions we may disclose details of such default to other auctioneers and live bidding platforms.
- 7.4 We are also working closely with third parties (including, for example, other auctioneers and live bidding platforms) and may receive information about you from them.
- 7.5 Where you provide us with personal information about other individuals, you must ensure that your provision of that information is compliant with applicable data protection law.

#### 8 COPYRIGHT

- 8.1 We shall have the right (on a non-exclusive basis) to photograph, video or otherwise produce an image of the Lot. All rights in such an image will belong to us, and we shall have the right to use it in whatever way we see fit.
- 8.2 The copyright in all images, illustrations and written material relating to a Lot is and shall remain at all times our property and we shall have the right to use it in whatever way we see fit. You shall not use or allow anyone else to use such images, illustrations or written material without our prior written consent.

#### 9 VAT

You shall give us all relevant information about your VAT status and that of the Lot to ensure that the correct information is printed in the catalogues. Once printed, the information cannot be changed. If we incur any unforeseen cost or expense as a result of the information being incorrect, you will reimburse to us on demand the full amount incurred.

### 10 NOTICES

All notices given under these Terms and Conditions may be served personally, sent by 1st class post, or faxed to the address given to the sender by the other party. Any notice sent by post will be deemed to have been received on the second working day after posting or, if the addressee is overseas, on the fifth working day after posting. Any notice sent by fax or served personally will be deemed to be delivered on the first working day following despatch.

# 11 ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS

The following provisions of this clause 11 shall apply only if you are acting for the purposes of your business.

# 11.1 Limitation of Liability

Subject to clause 6, we shall not be liable, whether in tort (including for negligence) or breach of statutory duty, contract, misrepresentation or otherwise for any:

- 11.1.1 loss of profits, loss of business, depletion of goodwill and/or similar losses, loss of anticipated savings, loss of goods, loss of contract, loss of use, loss of corruption of data or information; or
- 11.1.2 any special, indirect, consequential or pure economic loss, costs, damages, charges or expenses.

### 11.2 Severability

If any part of these Terms and Condition is found by any court to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable, that part may be discounted and the rest of the conditions shall continue to be valid and enforceable to the fullest extent permitted by law.

# 11.3 Force majeure

We shall have no liability to you if we are prevented from, or delayed in performing, our obligations under these Terms and Conditions or from carrying on our business by acts, events, omissions or accidents beyond our reasonable control, including (without limitation) strikes, lock-outs or other industrial disputes (whether involving our workforce or the workforce of any other party), failure of a utility service or transport network, act of God, war, riot, civil commotion, malicious damage, compliance with any law or governmental order, rule, regulation or direction, accident, breakdown of plant or machinery, fire, flood, storm or default of suppliers or subcontractors.

# 11.4 Waiver

- 11.4.1 A waiver of any right under these Terms and Conditions is only effective if it is in writing and it applies only to the circumstances for which it is given. No failure or delay by a party in exercising any right or remedy under these Terms and Conditions or by law shall constitute a waiver of that (or any other) right or remedy, nor preclude or restrict its further exercise. No single or partial exercise of such right or remedy shall preclude or restrict the further exercise of that (or any other) right or remedy.
- 11.4.2 Unless specifically provided otherwise, rights arising under these Terms and Conditions are cumulative and do not exclude rights provided by law.

### 11.5 Law and Jurisdiction

- 11.5.1 These Terms and Conditions and any dispute or claim arising out of or in connection with them or their subject matter, shall be governed by, and construed in accordance with, the law of England and Wales.
- 11.5.2 The parties irrevocably agree that the courts of England and Wales shall have exclusive jurisdiction to settle any dispute or claim that arises out of, or in connection with, Terms and Conditions or their subject matter.

The information shown on this page sets out the way in which Spink intends to account for VAT.

#### i. Margin Scheme and Auctioneers' Scheme

- 1. Where possible, we will offer Lots for sale under the Margin Scheme and Auctioneers' Scheme. Such Lots can be identified by the absence of any VAT symbol next to the Lot number in the catalogue. Such lots are subject to 20% VAT on the Buyers' Premium but are not subject to VAT on the Hammer Price.
- 2. Where Lots are sold using the Margin Scheme and Auctioneers' Scheme to UK VAT-registered businesses, the VAT on Buyers' Premium is not recoverable as input tax. Upon request on sale day, we will issue invoices that show VAT separately on both the Hammer Price and the Buyer's Premium. This will enable VAT-registered businesses to recover the VAT charged as input tax, subject to the normal rules for recovering input tax.

# ii. Zero-Rated Lots

Limited Categories of goods, such as books, are Zero-rated (o) for VAT in the United Kingdom. Such Lots are offered under the Auctioneers' Scheme. In these circumstances no VAT will be added to the Buyer's premium.
