Famed Dedication Medal designed by Albrecht Dürer in Honor of the Visit of Holy Roman Emperor Charles V to Nürnberg

provenance Nomos AG, TEFAF Maastricht, 14-23 March 2014, lot 46, where the provenance was given as 'From the collection of an Austrian noble family'. This is one of the most famous medals of the German Renaissance.

Struck in high relief on a massive 200g silver flan, in a complex process devised by the master silversmith Hans Krafft the Elder, the medal represents German 16th century medallic art at its most spectacular. The city of Nuremberg, renowned for the spectacular work of its thriving community of goldsmiths and silversmiths, was keenly aware that the world would judge the city on the merits of this one presentation medal. The portrait of the Emperor on the obverse was from a design by Germany's most famous artist, Albrecht Dürer, with input from his childhood friend, the Nuremberg Councillor Willibald Pirkheimer, while the array of heraldic shields on both sides was devised with meticulous care by the leading scholars of the day, including the humanist lawyer Johann Stabius and the clerk Lazarus Spengler.

The curious political circumstances that led to the creation of the medal have been fully documented. The new Emperor, Charles V, had inherited a vast array of kingdoms and lordships through the intricies of generations of careful dynastic marriages. He was young and charismatic. Above all, he was prepared to spend large fortunes (of his own money, and of other peoples' money) in the pursuit of power. This medal was the city of Nuremberg's homage to this new star that had arisen in Europe's political firmament. And there were very practical reasons for this. The city had a long tradition of loyalty to the German Emperor, and had acquired many privileges over the years. It played a central role in the Imperial Administration, was the venue for many political assemblies, as well as a centre for the collection of Imperial taxes.





Now this grand and very flattering medal was to be presented to the new young Emperor on the occasion of his first visit to the city at the very beginning of his reign, in the New Year of 1521, just after his coronation, and on the occasion of his first General Diet. It was quite simply the most important medal that any German city had yet commissioned. The drama of the events that unfolded precisely at the same time that this medal was being struck, is now the stuff of legend. Martin Luther had recently shaken the established Church by his preaching, and, in an increasingly hostile environment, attacks and counter-attacks were growing in frequency and ferocity. At the last minute it was decided that Luther should present his arguments in person before the Emperor, and so he was commanded to appear at the first Diet and present his defence. But now there was a clear and most embarrassing conflict of interests. The City of Nuremberg was not neutral in this debate. Many of her most prominent scholars and lawyers, including the men involved in creating this spectacular medal for the emperor, were known to be sympathetic to Martin Luther. Indeed, Willibald Pirkheimer and Lazarus Spengler were named as 'accomplices' in the Bull of Excommunication published against Luther at the beginning of January, just weeks before the Diet was due to take place, and they were also excommunicated. The Bull went on the declare that anyone found to be helping or even agreeing with Luther, was likewise to be excommunicated. This was a nervous time for the citizens of Nuremberg, and for a city that had become not just one of the wealthiest cities of the Empire, but also a major cultural centre, a city that had twenty one printing houses, all producing potentially contentious works, a city that had already won the approval of Luther himself who referred to the city as 'the eyes and ears of Germany'. In 1517 the Nuremberg City Councillor and former Mayor, Kaspar Nützel, had made a German translation of Luther's famous 'Ninety Five Theses' and this had been printed in Nuremberg. Suddenly, with the decision to bring this matter to a climax, it was clear that for the city of Nuremberg, the situation was increasingly dangerous.

And then, to disrupt all the carefully laid plans, there was the plague. The plague had been troubling many cities in Germany for the last year or two.

In fact there were outbreaks all the time, but in 1519-1520 there were more outbreaks than usual, and the cities along the Rhine were badly affected. In the second half of 1520 the plague moved inland, heading east, and by the end of the year was threatening Nurnberg. Although the city itself was not yet particularly badly affected, the Emperor clearly did not want to travel too far eastward through this plague infested region. And so all plans were changed. The Emperor did not visit Nuremberg, but instead held his Diet at Worms. Luther's admirer, Kaspar Nützel, represented Nuremberg at the Diet. And of course it was at Worms that Luther made his famous declaration, 'Heir stehe ich', and the rest, as they say, is history.

And what was to become of the medals of Nuremberg? One hundred medals had been made for presentation to the Emperor. A further sixty seven were made for other gifts. They represented a small fortune, not only in the cost of producing them, but in the value of the raw silver. The city now had a serious problem in that the medals could soon become useless. The iconography of the medal was strictly personal and, from the religious or political point of view, completely neutral. Perhaps this was intentional. The message was that here was a new Emperor with a world wide Empire, and that was all. But there were two problems.

Firstly the medals would certainly not be considered a suitable gift for the Emperor in Worms, since that city would never countenance presenting something known to have been produced by another city, and besides, they had a shield with N for Nuremberg prominent among the coats of arms around the border. And secondly they would become useless within the year because the date 1521 had been prominently placed by the Imperial Eagle on the reverse. There must have been some considerable hand-wringing, because it was not until 1537 that the decision was finally made to melt the medals. The dies and a small number of medals were preserved. An inventory of 1613 lists 24 examples still in the city's possession. And so the most magnificent medal of the German Renaissance became a historical curiosity, and, because of a twist of fate (perhaps some at the time would have called it Divine Intervention), a great rarity.

It is not known how many medals were preserved. There might well have been more than the 24 listed in 1613, since that inventory was only of the medals still in the City's possession, but today there are only 13 medals known, of which only four, including this example, are in private hands. Sadly, the magnificent dies used to strike the medal, carefully preserved for centuries by the city of Nuremberg, were moved to the mint at Munich in the mid 19th century, and are now lost. The City of Nuremberg has retained two examples of the medal, including the one, which is unique, from the first reverse die which cracked during the striking process. The other seven in museums are in very different states of preservation, and they can be found in Coburg, Edinburgh, London, Madrid, Munich, Paris and Vienna. Of the four in private hands one is badly damaged, while the other three are all in remarkably good condition.

This medal is believed to be the first Native American Award medal executed in America. The Philadelphia-based Friendly Association for Regaining and Preserving Peace with the Indians by Pacific Means commissioned Edward Duffield to prepare dies for award medals to be presented to Native Americans then engaged in discussions that would lead, a year later, to the signing of the Treaty at Easton, Pennsylvania. Duffield, a Philadelphia watchmaker, had earlier made the Kittanning medal (Betts 400) -- for a French and Indian War event the polar opposite of his new commission. After he prepared the dies, the Society supplied Spanish-American 8 Reales to serve as planchets. The medals were then struck by Society member Joseph Richardson. Duffield's dies remained with the Society until the 1810s when they were sent to the US Mint.

Kashmir tends to conjure up thoughts of lofty mountains and lush valleys, all reflected in the abundant lakes for which the area is justly famous. It is not an area renowned for its industry or coinage. It is this very fact that makes the Crab Zodiac Mohur of Kashmir, from the collection of the late Nicholas Rhodes, such a rare and special coin.

It was conceived of and struck by Jahangir, one of the Great Mughals, who reigned from 1605 until 1628. He was a man of great taste and cultivation, who suffered ill health in his final years due to his addiction to opium and wine. Charmed by the coolness and ambience of Kashmir, Jahangir made a courtly escape to its mountain valleys as often as possible during the hot season, always in the company of his favorite wife, Nur Jahan.

Unlike his father, Akbar the Great, Jahangir was not a famous general, an innovative administrator, or renowned builder, however he did enjoy designing formal Persian gardens, four of which still exist in Kashmir. Perhaps his genius was to favor a wife whose talents compensated for those he lacked, and the wisdom to allow her to use them. Nur Jahan was undoubtedly charismatic, beautiful and intelligent. Her talents ranged from big game hunting to design: of buildings and mausoleums as much as clothing. Her political astuteness enabled her to manoeuver over 20 of her relatives into positions of power. No wonder she exerted unusual influence over Jahangir to the extent that imperial orders were sometimes issued in her name, which also featured on quite a number of his coins.

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Akbar, among his many achievements, established a new syncretic religion, the Dīn Ilāhī (Divine Faith). This gave rise to a dating system, called the Ilāhī Era. Unlike the Islamic Hegira Era, this was based on the solar cycle, and it commenced on the New Year's Day (Nawroz) when the sun entered the sign of Aries in the year of Akbar's succession (AH963, 1556 AD). Although Jahangir did not continue dating by the Ilāhī Era, he kept using the solar year and its division into Ilāhī months. His coins are dated by his regnal year, each one commencing with the spring equinox, usually in conjunction with the Hegira year and Ilāhī month.

Mughal art reached its apogee under Jahangir, and his innovations in this line extended to his coinage, which is celebrated for featuring portraits of both himself and his father, Akbar, in defiance of the Islamic conventions regarding images.

Astronomical observations held the key to the timing of the important events such as New Year, the collection of land revenues and payments, as well as choosing auspicious moments for important ceremonies. The names of the Persian months had appeared on Akbar's Ilāhī coins, but Jahangir came up with the idea of replacing these with figural zodiac signs. It is fortunate that Jahangir's own diaries, the Tūzuk-i Jahāngīri, detail the birth of this concept in an entry made when the emperor's camp was near Ahmadabad, in Gujarat, on the 23rd day of the Ilāhī month Farwardīn:

"Previous to this, the rule of coinage was that on one face of the metal they stamped my name, and on the reverse the name of the place, and the month and the year of reign. At this time it entered my mind that in place of the month they should substitute the figure of the constellation which belonged to that month: for instance, in the month of Farwardīn the figure of a ram, and in Ardībihisht the figure of a bull. Similarly, in each month that a coin was struck, the figure of the constellation was to be on one face, as if the sun were emerging from it. This usage is my own, and has never been practiced until now." (Tūzuk-i Jahāngīri, vol.ii, p.6).

His word was law; Zodiac Rupees for the month of Farwardīn, with the image of the Ram, were indeed struck at Ahmadabad bearing the date AH1027. There also exist zodiac issues for each month of Jahangir's sojourn at Ahmadabad.

The issue of Zodiac coins continued throughout Jahangir's reign, although fewer were struck in his later years. Dates on most of the Zodiac coins made at the rarer mints such as Kashmir and Lahore coincide with a time that the Emperor was visiting the town in question; however, this was not the case at the capital, Agra.

By 1929 R.B. Whitehead had recorded some 243 gold Mohurs from this mint, dating from AH1027 to AH1034 (1618-24). These included examples of most zodiac signs for each year, including issues from many months when Jahangir was known to be travelling elsewhere.

He listed a mere handful of Zodiac Mohurs for each of the rare mints of Urdu (the camp, or travelling mint), Ajmer, Fathpur and Lahore. These are mostly housed in museums and almost never come up for sale. However, for Kashmir there was and is just one coin; the example above.

Provenance and History of the Rhodes Crab Mohur

The Rhodes Mohur was struck during a long visit to Kashmir that Jahangir made with Nur Jahan towards the end of his life. During a previous stay, he had commissioned silver zodiac Rupees with the sign Gemini, dated regnal year 15, AH1029. Only four examples of these are known, which are the only other Zodiac coins of Kashmir mint.

The gold Zodiac Mohur of Tīr (Cancer the Crab), of regnal year 20, dated AH1034 (1624), is the only known zodiacal Mohur of Kashmir mint, and it bears a very particular couplet, giving Nur Jahan full prominence as bādshāh begum (Empress: first lady).

The existence of other Zodiac issues of Kashmir, albeit in silver, demonstrates that Jahangir was in the habit of using the local mint to strike these coins, perhaps for special ceremonies or presentations. However, whatever its original purpose, by the time it had come to the attention of Western scholars the Rhodes Mohur had definitely seen some circulation, or been used in transactions of some kind, as can be seen from the schroffs (moneyer's) test marks evident on both flans.



It was first recorded in a paper by James Gibbs: Notes on the Zodiacal Rupees and Mohars of Jehangir Shah, read at a meeting of the Bombay Branch of the Royal Asiatic Society in December 1878, and then published in their Journal (no.XXXVI, Vol. XIV, pp.155-159). The accompanying illustration (plate III, image 4 / III), although poor, clearly identifies it as the Rhodes Mohur.

R.B. Whitehead described the coin in his paper "The Portrait Medals and Zodiacal Coins of the Emperor Jahāngīr." By then it had correctly attributed it to Kashmir mint. He relates that it was "acquired by Dr. da Cunha and sold to a Mr. Hatfield for $\pounds 4...$ "

The Da Cunha Sale was held at Sotheby in London, in 1889. An inspection of the (unillustrated) catalogue reveals the Rhodes Kashmir Mohur listed as lot 615. Interestingly this sale also contained a full set of Zodiac Mohurs (one of only eight known at the time) that was bought by Spink for £64 and subsequently went to America. All of these coins had been acquired by Dr Gerson da Cunha of Bombay from the collection formed by James Gibbs.

The Mohur next appears as lot 1635 (illustrated) in the Schulman of Amsterdam, 15-17th February, 1966, where it sold for 1250 Dutch Guilders. Unfortunately the provenance for this lot: "Ex Glendining Sale May 1962, lot 755 (wrongly described)" is not correct, as lot 755 was a Mohur of Taurus of different date.

THE NOMUS BRASILIANA COLLECTION

Forgery means a Lot constituting an imitation originally conceived and executed as a whole with a fraudulent intention to deceive as to authorship, origin, age, period, culture or source where the correct description as to such matters is not reflected by the description in the catalogue and which at the date of the auction had a value materially less than it would have had if it had been in accordance with the description in the catalogue. Accordingly, no Lot shall be capable of being a Forgery by reason of any damage and/or restoration work of any kind (including re-enamelling); **Hammer Price** means the amount of the highest bid accepted by the Auctioneer in relation to a Lot;

Lot means any item deposited with us for sale at auction and, in particular, the item or items described against any Lot number in any catalogue;

Purchase Price means the Hammer Price plus Buyer's premium and New York State and City tax, where applicable;

Reserve means the amount below which we agree with the Seller that the Lot cannot be sold;

Seller means the owner of the Lot being sold by us;

Spink Group means Spink and Son Limited, its subsidiaries and associated companies.

1.2 By making a bid, Bidder acknowledges acceptance of these terms and conditions and agrees to be bound by them.

2 SPINK'S ROLE AS AGENT

2.1 This is a public auction and mail-bid sale held by Spink, which is a licensed and bonded auctioneer.

2.2 All sales undertaken by us either at auction or privately are undertaken either as agent on behalf of the Seller or, from time to time, as principal if we are the owner of the Lot. Please note that even if we are acting as agent on behalf of the Seller, rather than as principal, we may have a financial interest in the Lot.

2.3 The contract for the sale of the Lot will be between you and the Seller.

3 BEFORE THE SALE

3.1 Examination of Goods

3.1.1 You are strongly advised to examine personally any goods in which you are interested, before the auction takes place. Condition reports are usually available on request. We provide no guarantee to you other than in relation to Forgeries, as set out in clause 5.10 of these Terms and Conditions.

3.1.2 All Bidders who have inspected the Lots prior to the auction will not be granted any return privileges, except for reasons of genuineness. It is presumed that all Floor Bidders have inspected the Lots prior to bidding. Therefore, Lots purchased by Floor Bidders are sold "AS IS" and may not be returned. Floor Bidders include those Bidders acting as agents for others.

3.1.3 Spink reserves the right to refuse to honour or reject any bid which, in its opinion, is not submitted in good faith, or, as the case dictates, is not supported by satisfactory references, as Spink, in its sole discretion, shall determine. Spink further reserves the right to ban any Bidder from participation in its sales for any reason deemed appropriate.

3.2 Catalogue Descriptions

3.2.1 Statements by us in the catalogue or condition report, or made orally or in writing elsewhere, regarding the authorship, origin, date, age, size, medium, attribution, genuineness, provenance, condition or estimated selling price of any Lot are merely statements of opinion, and are not to be relied on as statements of definitive fact. Catalogue and web illustrations are for guidance only, and should not be relied on either to determine the tone or colour of any item. No Lot shall be rejected on the grounds of inaccurate reproduction. No Lot illustrated in the catalogue and online shall be rejected on the grounds of cancellation, centering, margins, perforation or other characteristics apparent from the illustration. Estimates of the selling price should not be relied on as a statement that this price is either the price at which the Lot will sell or its value for any other purpose.

3.2.2 Many items are of an age or nature which precludes their being in perfect condition and some descriptions in the catalogue or given by way of condition report make reference to damage and/or restoration. We provide this information for guidance only and the absence of such a reference does not imply that an item is free from defects or restoration, nor does a reference to particular defects imply the absence of any others.

3.2.3 Other than as set out in clause 5.10, and in the absence of fraud, neither the Seller nor we, nor any of our employees or agents, are responsible for the correctness of any statement as to the authorship, origin, date, age, attribution, genuineness or provenance of any Lot nor for any other errors of description or for any faults or defects in any Lot. Every person interested should exercise and rely on his own judgment as to such matters.

3.3 Your Responsibility

3.3.1 You are responsible for satisfying yourself as to the condition of the goods and the matters referred to in the catalogue description.

3.4 Extensions - Stamps Only

3.4.1 If you wish to obtain an expert opinion or Certificate of Authenticity on any Lot (other than a mixed Lot or Lot containing undescribed stamps) you must notify us in writing not less than forty-eight hours before the time fixed for the commencement of the first session of the sale. If accepted by us, such request shall have the same effect as notice of an intention to question the genuineness or description of the Lot for the purposes of clause 5.10 (Refund in the case of Forgery) of these Terms and Conditions and the provisions of clause 5.10 (Refund in the case of Forgery) shall apply accordingly. 3.4.2 Notice of a request for an expert opinion or Certificate of Authenticity must give the reason why such opinion is required and specify the identity of your proposed expert which will be subject to agreement by us. We reserve the right, at our discretion, to refuse a request for an expert opinion or Certificate of Authenticity including (without limitation) where the proposed expert is not known to us.

3.4.3 If we accept a request for an expert opinion or Certificate of Authenticity we will submit the Lot to the Expert Committee. You acknowledge and accept that the length of time taken by an Expert Committee to reach an opinion will vary depending on the circumstances and in any event is beyond our control.

3.4.4 We will not accept a request for an extension on account of condition. Any Lot described in the catalogue as having faults or defects may not be returned even if an expert opinion or Certificate of Authenticity cites other faults or defects not included in the catalogue description, other than in the case of a Forgery.

3.4.5 Should Spink accept a request for an extension under the foregoing provisions of this paragraph, the fact may be stated by the Auctioneer from the rostrum prior to the sale of the Lot.

3.4.6 It should be noted that any stamp accompanied by a Certificate of Authenticity is sold on the basis of that certificate only and not on the basis of any other description or warranty as to authenticity. No request for an extension will be accepted on such a stamp and the return of such a stamp will not be accepted.

3.4.7 If you receive any correspondence from the Expert Committee in relation to the Lot, including but not limited to a Certificate of Authenticity, you must provide us with copies of such correspondence no later than seven (7) days after you receive such correspondence.

4 AT THE SALE

4.1 Refusal of Admission

Our sales usually take place on our own premises or premises over which we have control for the sale, and we have the right, exercisable at our complete discretion, to refuse admission to the premises or attendance at an auction.

4.2 Registration Before Bidding

All bidders must be registered either by completing a registration form or creating an account online. Please be aware that we usually require buyers to present identification before making a bid at auction, undergo a credit check or provide a trade reference. If you have not bid successfully with Spink in the past, or you are registering with us for the first time, we reserve the right to require a deposit of up to 50% of the amount you intend to spend. Such deposit will be deducted from your invoice should you be successful. If you are unsuccessful at auction, your deposit will be returned by the same means it was paid to Spink. Some Lots may be designated, prior to the auction, as "Premium Lots", which means a deposit may be required before placing a bid on the item for sale. Information will be posted on our website in such an event.

4.3 Bidding as Principal

When making a bid (whether such bids are made in person or by way of telephone bids operated by Spink, commission or online or email bids), you will be deemed to be acting as principal and will be accepting personal liability, unless it has been agreed in writing, at the time of registration, that you are acting as agent on behalf of a third party buyer acceptable to us.

4.4 Commission Bids

4.4.1 If you give us instructions to bid on your behalf, by using the form provided in our catalogues, or via our website, we shall use reasonable endeavours to do so, provided these instructions are received not later than twenty-four hours before the auction. If we receive commission bids on a particular Lot for identical amounts, and at auction these bids are the highest bids for the Lot, it will be sold to the person whose bid was received first. Commission Bids are undertaken subject to other commitments at the time of the sale, and the conduct of the auction may be such that we are unable to bid as requested. Since this is undertaken as a free service to prospective buyers on the terms stated, we cannot accept liability for making (or failing to make) a Commission Bid. You should therefore always attend personally if you wish to be certain of bidding. If we receive two Commission Bids for equal value for the same Lot, the Bid received first by us shall take precedence.

4.4.2. For all Commission Bids, you must supply your name and address, contact telephone number and email. You must also provide the Lot number and description of the Lot, the amount of your Bid and any other information requested in the Commission Bid Form or by us. It is your responsibility to provide the correct information and to ensure that we have received your Commission Bid.

4.4.3 If you submit a Commission Bid verbally (whether by telephone or otherwise), we shall not be responsible for any misunderstandings (by either us or our agent or you) in relation to your bid. All bids made in this way must be confirmed in writing by you before the Auction.

4.4.4 Bids will be executed for mail bidders at one advance over the next highest bid in competition with floor and/or internet bidders, until the maximum bid is executed for the mail bidder, or until the lot is sold. No buy or unlimited bids will be accepted.

4.5 On-line Bidding

We offer internet services as a convenience to our clients. We will not be responsible for errors or failures to execute bids placed on the internet, including, without limitation, errors or failures caused by (i) a loss of internet connection by either party for whatever reason; (ii) a breakdown or problems with the online bidding software and/or (iii) a breakdown or problems with your internet connection, computer or system. Execution of on-line internet bids on www.spink.com and Spink Live is a free service undertaken subject to other commitments at the time of the auction and we do not accept liability for failing to execute an online internet bid or for errors or omissions in connection with this activity.

4.6 Telephone Bids

If you make arrangements with us not less than twenty-four hours before the sale, we shall use reasonable endeavours to contact you to enable you to participate in bidding by telephone, but in no circumstances will we be liable to either the Seller or you as a result of failure to do so.

4.7 Video Images

At some auctions there will be a video screen. Mistakes may occur in its operation, and we cannot be liable to you regarding either the correspondence of the image to the Lot being sold or the quality of the image as a reproduction of the original.

4.8 Bidding Increments

Bidding generally opens below the low estimate and advances in the following order although the Auctioneer may vary the bidding increments during the course of the auction. The normal bidding increments are:

4.9 Bidding by Spink

4.9.1 We reserve the right to bid on Lots on the Seller's behalf up to the amount of the Reserve (if any), which will never be above the low estimate printed in the auction catalogue.

4.9.2 The Spink Group reserves the right to bid on and purchase Lots as principal.

4.9.3 Spink reserves the right to bid on any Lot in the sale. Additionally, Spink may or may not have financial interest in any of the Lot(s) in the sale.

4.10 The Auctioneer's Discretion

4.10.1 The Auctioneer has the right, to be exercised in good faith, to refuse any bid, to advance the bidding in such manner as he may decide, to withdraw or divide any Lot, and to combine any two or more Lots. Bidding shall be regulated by the Auctioneer. 4.10.2 The Auctioneer may reopen the bidding on a Lot under the following circumstances: (a) the Auctioneer has failed to execute correctly a mail bid; (b) a party purchasing the Lot on the floor has done so in error; (c) where a protest is made after the hammer has fallen but before bidding has commenced on the next Lot; (d) where the Auctioneer has determined that he/ she has overlooked a party still bidding on the Lot but before the calling of the next Lot or (e) to effectuate a fair and reasonable resolution of any error or dispute. In the event of a dispute, the Auctioneer's decision shall be final. 4.10.3 In the event of any dispute between Bidders, the Auctioneer may, at its sole discretion, immediately put the Lot up for sale again. The Auctioneer's decision shall be final and binding upon all Bidders.

4.10.4 The Auctioneer reserves the right to postpone the sale by auction for a reasonable period of time as a result of any significant event which, in the sole discretion of the Auctioneer, makes it advisable to postpone the event. No prospective Bidder or prospective Buyer shall have recourse as a result of any postponement.

4.11 Successful Bid

4.11.1 The highest Bidder for each Lot shall be the Buyer. Subject to the provisions of Clause 4.10, the striking of the Auctioneer's hammer marks the acceptance of the highest bid, provided always that such bid is higher than the Reserve (where applicable), and the conclusion of a contract for sale between you and the Seller.

4.12 Spink's Own Material

Auctioneer reserves the right to include in any auction its own material as well as material from affiliated or related companies, principals, officers or employees. Auctioneer may have direct or indirect interest in any of the Lots in the Auction and may collect commissions.

4.13 After Sale Arrangements

If you enter into any private sale agreements for any Lot with the Seller within sixty days of the auction, we, as exclusive agents of the Seller reserve the right to charge you the applicable Buyer's Premium in accordance with these terms and conditions, and the Seller a commission in accordance with the terms of the Seller's agreement.

4.14 Return of Lot

4.14.1 All the Lots are sold as genuine. For the purpose of this sale, "genuine" is defined as not faked or forged and Spink will not knowingly sell any item that has been "repaired', "restored", "processed", "cleaned", "pressed" or "conserved" in any way without disclosure of such facts to the potential Buyer.

4.14.2 No Lots may be returned without a written request by the successful Bidder and the written approval of Spink. In the unlikely event of returning a Lot, Spink must receive notification of the Buyer's intent within three (3) days of the Buyer's receipt of the Lot. The following Lots may not be returned for any reason whatsoever: (a) Lots containing ten or more items; (b) Lots described as having faults or defects because of the faults described or any others, including lots described as "repaired", "corroded", "holed", "whizzed", or similar damage, except for non-authenticity; (c) illustrated Lots because of centering, margins, etc. or other factors shown in the illustrations; (d) Lots described "AS IS", including third party graded coins or banknotes (i.e. PCGS, NGC, ANACS, ICG); (e) Lots valued primarily for the bullion content; (f) Lots examined by postal viewers; and (g) any philatelic extension Lot unless the conditions set forth in Item 3.4 above is complied with fully. Except for Lots placed on extension, as per the conditions of Item 3.4 above, no Lots may be returned for any reason whatsoever after thirty days from sale date. Late payment for purchase may, at Spink's option, be considered just cause to revoke all return privileges. If any disputes arise regarding payment, authenticity, or description between the Bidder and Spink, Spink, at its sole discretion, may submit the disputed matter to binding arbitration before the American Arbitration Association in New York, NY, to which the Bidder, by placing a bid and hereby accepting these terms and conditions of sale, agrees to be bound.

5 AFTER THE AUCTION

5.1 Buyer's Premium and Other Charges

In addition to the Hammer Price, you must pay us the Buyer's Premium at a rate of 20% of the final Hammer price of each lot, postage charge and a fee for paying by card.

5.2 Sales Tax

All Lots are subject to applicable state and local taxes, unless appropriate resale certificates are on file with Spink.

5.3 Payment

5.3.1 You must provide us with your full name and permanent address and, if so requested, details of the bank from which any payments to us will be made. You must pay the full amount due (comprising the amounts set forth in Clause

5.1 above and any applicable New York State sales tax, unless the Lot is exempt) within seven days after the date of the sale. This applies even if you wish to export the Lot and an export licence is (or may be) required.

5.3.2 You will not acquire title to the Lot until all amounts due have been paid in full. This includes instances where special arrangements were made for release of the Lot prior to full settlement.

5.3.3 Spink reserves the right to await clearance of any check used for payment before delivery of any item and a \$25.00 charge will be applied for any check that fails to clear.

5.3.4 All sales are strictly for cash, check and bank/wire transfer in United States dollars; however, Spink will only accept cash payments under \$10,000.00. Spink offers clients the option of paying by credit card (Visa, MasterCard, and American Express only) in United States Dollars for a convenience charge of two-percent (2%) for Visa and MasterCard and four-percent (4%) for American Express, up to a total of \$30,000.00. Credit card payments will only be accepted if (a) the purchase is made by the card holder, (b) any purchased items to be shipped are shipped to the cardholder's verified billing address, (c) floor Bidders present their credit cards and (d) all returns are governed by the terms and conditions of the sale. Payment is due and payable immediately upon receipt of the auction invoice or, if payment is to be made at the auction site, simultaneously with receipt of the purchased items.

5.3.5 Payments should be made by the registered Buyer and not by third parties, unless it has been agreed at the time of registration that you are acting as an agent on behalf of a third party.

5.4 Notification

We are not able to notify successful Bidders by telephone. While Invoices are sent out by mail after the auction we do not accept responsibility for notifying you of the result of your bid. You are requested to contact us by telephone or in person as soon as possible after the auction to obtain details of the outcome of your bids to avoid incurring charges for late payment.

5.5 Collection of Purchases

5.5.1 Unless specifically agreed to the contrary, we shall retain Lots purchased until all amounts due to us, or to the Spink Group, have been paid in full. Buyers will be required to pay for their Lot(s) when they wish to take possession of the same, which must be within seven days of the date of the sale, unless prior arrangements have been made with Spink. Without prior agreement, Lots will not be released until cleared funds are received with regard to payments made by check.

5.5.2 Unless we notify you to the contrary, items retained by us will be covered under our insurance policy, which is available for inspection at our offices, from the date of sale for a period of seven days or until the time of collection, whichever is sooner. The risk of loss for the lot purchased by you shall be entirely yours after the earliest of seven days from the date of sale or from the time of collection.

5.5.3 Our policy will not cover and we are unable to accept responsibility for damage caused by woodworm, changes in atmospheric conditions or acts of terrorism.

5.6 Packing and handling

5.6.1 We shall use all reasonable endeavours to take care when handling and packing a purchased Lot but remind you that after seven days from the date of sale or from the time of collection, whichever is sooner, the risk of loss with respect to the lot purchased by you is entirely yours. Our postage charges are set out in Clause 11 of these Terms and Conditions.

5.6.2 It is the responsibility of the Buyer to be aware of any import duties that may be incurred upon importation to the final destination. Spink will not accept return of any package in order to avoid these duties. The onus is also on the Buyer to be aware of any import restrictions that prohibit the importation of certain collectibles. Spink will not accept return of the Lot(s) if rejected for importation or if Buyer fails to pay appropriate import duties. Spink will not accept responsibility for Lot(s) seized or destroyed by any customs agencies.

 $5.\dot{6.3}$ Delivery of any Lot(s) to an address other than the invoiced address will be at Spink's sole discretion.

5.7 Recommended Packers and Shippers

5.7.1 Shipping, handling and administration charges will be added to invoices for Lots delivered by mail. All Lots will be shipped via U.S. Express Mail to Post Office boxes, via Federal Express to street addresses, and via FedEx ground for bulky large lots (in the U.S. only). Buyer will be responsible for the total purchase price in the event of loss. Spink is not responsible for the loss of any merchandise shipped outside the United States. Insurance of any items to be shipped outside the United States is solely the responsibility of the Buyer. It is also the responsibility of the Buyer to provide adequate insurance coverage for the items once they are in his/her possession. Unless the risk of loss shall be borne by the Buyer following shipment of the items and Spink assumes no liability for merchandise lost, stolen or damaged while in the possession of any shipper to whom merchandise has been delivered, nor for any FedEx shipment which is subject to a "signature release" on file with FedEx, or otherwise.

5.7.2 If required, our shipping department may arrange shipment as your

agent. Although we may suggest carriers if specifically requested, our suggestions are made on the basis of our general experience of such parties in the past and we are not responsible to any person to whom we have made a recommendation for the acts or omissions of the third parties concerned.

5.8 Remedies for Non-Payment

5.8.1 If you fail to make payment within fifteen days of the payment date set out by your invoice, we shall be entitled to exercise one or more of the following rights or remedies:

5.8.1.1 to charge interest at the rate of 1.5% per month compound interest, calculated on a daily basis, from the date the full amount is due;

5.8.1.2 to set off against any amounts which Spink or the Spink Group may owe you in any other transaction the outstanding amount remaining unpaid by you;

5.8.1.3 we may retain all or some of the Lot(s) purchased by you, or other property in the possession of Spink or the Spink Group, until you have paid all the amounts you owe us or the Spink Group, even if the unpaid amounts do not relate to those Lots or other property. Following fourteen days' notice to you of the amount outstanding and remaining unpaid, Spink and the Spink Group shall have the right to arrange the sale of such Lot(s) or other property. We may apply the proceeds of such sale in satisfaction of the debt outstanding and due us or the Spink Group, and may remit any remaining balance to you;

5.8.1.4 where several amounts are owed by you to the Spink Group in respect of different transactions, to apply any amount paid to discharge any amount owed in respect of any particular transaction, whether or not you so direct;

5.8.1.5 to reject at any future auction any bids made by you or on your behalf or obtain a deposit from you before accepting any bids.

5.8.2 If you fail to make payment within thirty-five days, we shall in addition be entitled:

5.8.2.1 to cancel the sale of the Lot or any other item sold to you at the same or any other auction;

5.8.2.2 to arrange a resale of the Lot, publicly or privately, and, if this results in a lower price being obtained, claim the balance from you together with all reasonable costs including a 10% seller's commission, expenses, damages, legal fees, commissions and premiums of whatever kind associated with both sales or otherwise, incurred in connection with your failure to make payment; or

5.8.2.3 when reselling the Lot, to place a notice in our catalogue stating that you successfully purchased the Lot at auction but have subsequently failed to pay the Hammer Price of the Lot,

5.8.2.4 In the event Spink refers an invoice(s) to an attorney for collection, the Buyer agrees to pay Spink attorney's fees, court costs, witness fees and other costs incurred by Spink;

5.8.2.5 take any other reasonable and appropriate action as we deem fit.

5.9 Failure to Collect

Where purchases are not collected within seven days after the sale, whether or not payment has been made, you will be required to pay a storage charge of \$2 per item per day plus any additional handling cost that may apply. You will not be entitled to collect the Lot until all outstanding charges are met, together with payment of all other amounts due to us.

5.10 Refund in the case of Forgery

5.10.1 A sale will be cancelled, and the amount paid refunded to you if a Lot (other than a miscellaneous item not described in the catalogue) sold by us proves to have been a Forgery. We shall not however be obliged to refund any amounts if either (a) the catalogue description or saleroom notice at the auction date corresponded to the generally accepted opinion of scholars or experts at that time, or fairly indicated that there was a conflict of opinions, or (b) it can be demonstrated that the Lot is a Forgery only by means of either a scientific process not generally accepted for use until after publication of the catalogue or a process which at the date of the auction was unreasonably expensive or impracticable or likely to have caused damage to the Lot. Furthermore, you should note that this refund can be obtained only if the following conditions are met:

5.10.1.1 you must notify us in writing, within seven days of the receipt of the Lot(s), that in your view the Lot concerned is a Forgery;

5.10.1.2 you must then return the item to us within fourteen days from receipt of the Lot(s), in the same condition as at the auction date; and

5.10.1.3 as soon as possible following return of the Lot, you must produce evidence satisfactory to us that the Lot is a Forgery and that you are able to transfer good title to us, free from any third party claims.

5.10.1.4 you must provide us all evidence obtained by you that a Lot is a Forgery no later than seven (7) days after you receive such evidence

5.10.2 In no circumstances shall we be required to pay you any more than the amount paid by you for the Lot concerned and you shall have no claim for interest.

5.10.3 The benefit of this guarantee is not capable of being transferred, and is solely for the benefit of the person to whom the original invoice was made out by us in respect of the Lot when sold and who, since the sale, has remained the owner of the Lot without disposing of any interest in it to any third party.

5.10.4 We shall be entitled to rely on any scientific or other process to establish that the Lot is not a Forgery, whether or not such process was used or in use at the date of the auction.

5.11 USE OF DEFAULT INFORMATION

If you fail to make payment for a Lot in accordance with these Terms and Conditions

5.11.1 we reserve the right to refuse you the right to make bids for any future auction irrespective of whether previous defaults have been settled; and

5.11.2 you acknowledge that we may (as necessary for our legitimate interests those of other auctioneers and live bidding platforms in referencing customers and avoiding customer defaults) disclose details of such default to other auctioneers and live bidding platforms, which will include your name, address, nature of the default and the date of the default. Auctioneers or live bidding platforms who receive details of the default may rely on such information when deciding whether to enter into a transaction with you in the future.

6 LIABILITY

Nothing in these terms and conditions limits or excludes our liability for: 6.1 death or personal injury resulting from negligence; or

6.2 any damage or liability incurred by you as a result of our fraud or fraudulent misrepresentation.

7 USE OF YOUR PERSONAL INFORMATION

7.1 We will use the personal information you provide to us as set out in our privacy notice (available at https://spink.com/privacy-policy) and in particular to:

7.1.1 process the bids you make on Lots (whether successful or otherwise) and other auction related services we provide;

7.1.2 process your payment relating to a successful purchase of a Lot;

7.1.3 arrange for delivery of any Lot you purchase, which will include passing your details to shipping providers and, on overseas deliveries, to customs where they make enquiries regarding the Lot;

7.1.4 inform you about similar products or services that we provide, but you may stop receiving these at any time by contacting us.
