This probably identifies these (and the present specimen) as a very late Edward IV issue, although the aspiration of owning a coin struck for the incarcerated Princes in the Tower' will render this an enduringly popular type, as evidenced by the incredible price realisations witnessed for this very coin in the 1920s and 1930s.







The allies having resolved to attack Mons, were compelled to pass the strong lines which Villars had formed from that city to the Sambre. Marlborough, with his usual skilful manoeuvring and rapid marches deceived Villars, passed the lines and invested the place. Villars resolved to risk a battle for its protection and to penetrate through the woods of Raisnieres and Lanieres, but was surprised to see Marlborough drawn up on the other side and ready to oppose him. Whilst Marlborough entrenched himself and after a very sanguinary battle, in which he himself was wounded, his army retreated in a very masterly manner under the direction of Boufflers. The right of the French, where the attack was commenced, was drawn up on the plain of Malplaquet from whence the battle usually takes its name. The unanimity and valour of the generals and troops of the Allies were never more conspicuous than on this day.

The campaign of 1711 was conducted by Marlborough, he resolved to invest Bouchain but it was first necessary to pass the lines which Villars had constructed in the direction of Arras and Cambray with such strength that he deemed them impregnable and called of skilful movements and manoeuvers. Marlborough utterly deceived Villars and passed the lines without the loss of a man. He then invested Bouchain in the face of the superior army of the French and on the 3/14 September the garrison surrendered themselves prisoners of war. Marlborough here "exhibited a sublimity of military talent which justly stamped this campaign as not the least scientific and glorious of his whole campaign"

This medal commemorating the Peace of Utrecht was struck by authority and distributed at the public expense to members of both houses of parliament and to other persons. There were at least two pairs of dies used.

The Treaty of Utrecht is the general name of a series of treaties which in 1713 and 1714 concluded the war of the Spanish succession. Philip of Spain renounced claim to the French throne. Louis XIV recognised the protestant succession in England and undertook to give no more help to the Stuarts. He also ceded Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, St Kitts and the Hudson Bay Territory. Spain ceded Gibraltar and Minorca and interests to the Slave Trade. The treaties were bitterly assailed by the whigs and after the accession of George I. Bolingbroke, Oxford, Ormonde and Strafford were impeached for it.

New York, Nutmeg and Nathaniel Courthope

With hindsight, the Treaty of Breda (1667) [see lot 162] must be viewed as one of the most defining tactical decisions in human history. Famously sacrificing a claim to an established colony in the New World for a tiny enclave at Palua Run, is the reason today we know the 'Big Apple' as New York and why Indonesia has all but the Royal Dutch blue in its national ensign. As a leading international broadsheet glibly put this exchange: 'one has Times Square, the other electricity for just five hours a day.'

The reason? Spice. More particularly nutmeg, for which Banda and by extension the Dutch East India Company (VOC) enjoyed a lucrative global monopoly. However this came to be threatened on Christmas Day, 1616, when Nataniel Courthope and his illustrious band of 39-sailors would lay claim to the island of Run and its inhabitants for King James I. Constructing a fortress to defend the new source of English nutmeg, the Dutch would lay siege to the island for 1,540 days, until they had killed Courthouse and all the male islanders, exiled and enslaved the women and children, and eradicated every tree on the land mass. Following a further recapture attempt in 1638, the Dutch would conduct annual visits to the Island to ensure no English presence until the Treaty of Breda officially ended the territorial dispute. But such was the impact of Courthope's initial resistance that English claim to the territory became collateral barter, and from which his simple pursuit of nutmeg would gain King Charles II absolute ownership of Manhattan.

Were this not injury enough to Anglo-Dutch relations, the subsequent rise of Bonaparte would revert Holland to a vassal kingdom by 1810, prompting English forces to invade the now Napoleonic-owned 'Spice Islands' and attempt to recapture Banda. Time had not stood still in the intervening two centuries, with the once strategic shoreside fort now seriously imperilled by the growing reach of the British Royal Navy; the force now buoyed by their successes at Camperdown and Trafalgar.

Ironically the contingent sent to recapture Banda included a former French frigate that itself had been captured after a bloody 3-day engagement with HMS St. Fiorenzo.

America today may be a flashpoint by mere mention of the second amendment. In reality, it should be reflecting on the implications of 'Article 3 - uti possidetis' or "what you have, you hold" when the arbitrary line in the sand was drawn on 20 May 1667. At that time British forces held the New Netherlands, and thereby set in motion a butterfly effect that has shaped the course of all of subsequent geopolitical history.

In 1841, William Wyon, Chief Engraver to the Royal Mint was commissioned to design a medal to be awarded "... when assistance has been afforded by Foreigners to subjects of Her Majesty who have been in danger, in consequence of disasters at sea, or otherwise.., to Foreigners who have particularly distinguished themselves on such occasions...". The original intention was for a common reverse, bearing the inscription 'Victoria Regina Cudi Jussit MDCCCXLI', but in the event this reverse was never used, and early awards were made with the reverse struck from a specially commissioned die, bearing details of the rescue and the name of the recipient. In 1850, owing to the expense of creating a new reverse die for each award, a standard reverse was instituted, with the new inscription 'For Saving the Life of a British Subject'. The medal was approved by Queen Victoria later that year, but was superceded in 1867 by the introduction of the Albert Medal.

Curiously there is no trace of Edward Fletcher Esq of Liverpool performing a gallant act or indeed of ever saving a life at sea. From ancestral records his life began and ended rather unremarkably in Liverpool. Born 6 March 1803 to Joseph and Elizabeth Fletcher of Paradise Street, by the 1861 Census, he was recorded as a resident of Toxteth Park, living with his unmarried elder sister Arabella, and a profession listed as 'Wine Merchant'. Tragically he would die only eight months after the presentation of these awards, his will being granted with less that £100 to his name. By sheer good fortune however a remarkable surviving archive of contemporary letters has been consigned alongside the present lots on offer that sheds a fascinating light into the direct interaction of Queen Victoria with her loyal subjects, and indeed the key workings of her newly appointed Keeper of the Privy Purse, Sir Thomas Myddelton Biddulph. Transcribed below are the salient points of the month-long correspondence between Liverpool, Buckingham Palace, and Balmoral that reveal the remarkable exchange of artwork for these very medals at the personal request of Queen Victoria.

31 High Street, Liverpool, Sept. 22, 1866

(Fletcher to Biddulph)

Sir,

I have held in my possession for many years a picture in enamel of Her Majesty the Queen by a London artist after the picture by [Edmund Thomas] Parris of 1839 ... and another after the artist, the companion picture of his Royal Highness and the late Serving Consort in enamel 'both 7 x 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ '

I am deeply honoured by your letter of 24th inst. conveying to me exciting intelligence of her Majesty's approval of the Royal Portraits. I have also to acknowledge the receipt of the express packet containing two very beautiful medals of Her Majesty and the late Prince Consort. I beg that you will be kind enough to express to Her Majesty my warmest gratitude and thanks for this most gracious gift of her favour and condescention [sic]. To me they will soon be a dearly cherished evidence of the Queen's munificent generosity as well as a memorial of the most gratifying incident in my life.

In September 1825, the government of La Rioja approved the creation of the 'Banco de Rescates y Casa de Moneda' (Bailout Bank and Mint), many of whose shareholders were political authorities or relatives. In January 1826, Bernardino Rivadavia was named first Argentine president and created 'El Banco Nacional' (the National Bank) with exclusive right to mint coins within the entire national territory, but negotiations with the province of La Rioja did not go well. In September of the same year, La Rioja refused to recognize the new government and its institutions.

Rivadavia proceeded to send troops under the command of Gregorio Araoz de Lamadrid, hero of Argentinian Independence, only to be defeated several times by the 'caudillo' (strongman) of La Rioja, Juan Facundo Quiroga.

Rivadavia's unitarian regime was fighting the Federalists - a union of the province who each retained their own autonomy - but strived to achieve a concentration of power and thus gain the ability to fight against the Unitarians and the centralization of power in Buenos Aires. Most of the Federalists were caudillos, defending the idea that each province should have its own government and make its own decisions, while the Unitarians maintained that the power should be concentrated in a single nation-state with its capital in Buenos Aires.

Rivadavia resigned in June 1827 and the presidential regime fell, while the provinces resorted to self-governance, delegating foreign relations to the Federal governor of Buenos Aires, Manuel Dorrego. In 1828 a peace treaty was signed with Brazil after a prolonged war

by the 'Banda Oriental' (the Eastern Bank of the River Uruguay, now known as just Uruguay). Returning from the war, General Lavalle overthrew Dorrego and assumed the role of Governor. The bloodiest civil wars began with Dorrego's execution by firing squad without trial.

Soon after Lavalle's minister José Mar'a Paz defeated Juan Bautista Bustos in Córdoba, the second-largest city of the country, and with its allies, who occupied nine provinces, formed the Unitary League of the Interior, of which he was named chief, but not of Buenos Aires, where Lavalle signed a peace accord with Federalist Juan Manuel de Rosas, who became governor for the first time at the end of 1829.

Paz then sent his second-in-command, Araoz de Lamadrid, to La Rioja to immediately assume control of the government with the express mission to mint coins. Following defeat, Quiroga ordered an exodus from the city and the burial of all Minting tools and machines as well as much of the specie in the now-famous tapados (hoards) in the region of Los Llanos, giving rise to the coin's sobriquet today of 'Los Tapados de Quiroga'.

These hoards were eventually found and retrieved. By Lamadrid's estimate the hoard consisted of 40,000 pesos; according to Quiroga it was 93,000 pesos (an 8 escudos coin was equivalent to 17 pesos) Along with the coins were the dies used for coins minted in 1828. Lamadrid would go on to mint coins in 1830 and early 1831.

After several battles, Paz was defeated and taken prisoner. Quiroga defeated Lamadrid definitively in Ciudadela in the province of Tucumán at the end of 1831 and returned triumphant to La Rioja in March 1832. He was already a national hero and an ally of Rosas and of another important caudillo, Estanislao López, Governor of Santa Fé.

The Federalists had returned to La Rioja in February 1831, taking total control by November of that year, and continued minting 8 reales pieces for several years more. While all of the same design as the pre-1831 issues, their fineness in silver varied, affecting their appearance and making them very hard to grade now.



JOHN BUCHAN, 1ST BARON TWEEDSMUIR OF ELSFIELD (1875-1940)

John Buchan, 1st Baron Tweedsmuir of Elsfield (1875-1940) had an extraordinary and varied career as Journalist, Soldier, Lawyer and Politician culminating in being appointed Governor General of Canada in 1935. Throughout his career he was a prolific author most famous for his thrillers of which the Thirty-Nine Steps is one of the best known and most influential spy stories ever written.

John Buchan was born in Perth in 1875, the eldest son of the Reverend John Buchan, a minister in the Free Church of Scotland, and his wife Helen. His early childhood was spent in Kirkcaldy in Fife, moving to Glasgow in 1888 when his father took over a parish in the Goirbals. This enabled him to attend Hutchesons Grammar School and then briefly, Glasgow University before winning a scholarship to Brasnose College in Oxford; where he took a first in Greats. By the time he left Oxford he had already published six books of fiction, poetry and history, and the boy who when he arrived could not afford to dine in hall classed himself as "rather rich for an undergraduate".

After university he worked as a freelancer for the Spectator while studying for the bar. Although he passed his exams in 1901, he did not immediately practice, Instead, he joined Lord Milner coordinating the rebuilding of South Africa after the second Boer War. The two years he spent as part of "Milner's Kindergarten" informed his views on Empire and the potential the imperial ideal had to improve lives, as well as giving him a deep love for South Africa which features in a number of his novels.

Returning from South Africa to London he continued to work for the Spectator, practise as a Barrister and write. In 1907 he married Susan Grosvenor and to support his married status became a partner in the publishers, Thomas Nelson. His interest in politics was growing at this time and in 1911 he became the Conservative and unionist candidate for Peebles and Selkirk though he did not enter parliament until 1927.

At the start of the First World War he was not fit enough for active service suffering from intestinal problems which plagued the rest of his life. However, he worked for the Times as War Correspondent and wrote for the the War Propaganda Bureau. In 1915 while recovering from an illness he wrote his most famous work: Thirty Nine Steps, introducing the world to Richard Hannay who would star in a total of five novels. In 1916 he went out to the Western Front as an Intelligence Officer serving on the headquarters staff with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. In 1917, he was made Director of Information working for Lord Beaverbrook.

After the war he continued to work for Nelsons as well as being a Director of Reuters and moved his family to Elsfield in Oxfordshire. He now had four children. He continued to write prolifically and still nurtured political ambitions which led to hm becoming the MP for the Scottish Universities in 1927 a seat he held until 1935 when he was appointed Governor General of Canada.

John Buchan was the First appointment of Governor General made by the King and the Canadian council rather than a British political appointment. In 1931, the Statute of Westminster had changed the relationship between Britain and Canada granting Canada control over its own foreign policy and making it a political equal of the United Kingdom sharing a common monarch. Although the Canadians wanted a commoner to be appointed the King insisted that the Governor General should be elevated to the Peerage and Buchan became Lord Tweedsmuir of Elsfield.

Arriving in Canada in 1935 Buchan worked to encourage a distinct Canadian identity and national unity and publicly stated that Canada's first loyalty should be Canada and Canada's King rather than the Commonwealth of Nations. He also believed that the different ethnic groups should "retain their individuality and each make a contribution to the national character".

In 1939 with war looming the King and Queen made a state visit to Canada spending a month touring the nation form coast to coast. This was the first time a reigning Canadian Monarch had set foot in Canada and arguably the most successful royal tour in Canadian history. This included the first Royal "walkabout" which arose spontaneously when the royal couple mingled with 25,000 First World War veterans in Ottawa.

The timing of this visit was critical in renewing ties between Britain and Canada helping to ensure support for joining Britain in the war effort. The separation of British and Canadian foreign policy meant that Canada did not automatically declare war along with Great Britain. However, on 10 September 1939 the Canadian Prime Minister, Mackenzie King, advised George VI to declare war on Germany in his capacity as King of Canada – just one week after the United Kingdom made its declaration.

On 6 February 1940 Buchan suffered a head injury brought on by a stroke. He died on 11 February. Mackenzie King in a radio eulogy said, "In the passing of His Excellency, the people of Canada have lost one of the greatest and most revered of their Governors General, and a friend who, from the day of his arrival in this country, dedicated his life to their service.". Buchan was given a state funeral in Ottawa before his ashes we sent back to be interred in the churchyard at Elsfield.

Louis was old enough to succeed his father in 1342, but his deeply religious mother enforced a protectorate upon him, largely on account of the centralised governance of the kingdom and its rich treasury. Almost immediately, Louis launched a crusade against the Lithuanians and restored royal power in Croatia; his troops defeating a Tatar army, and expanding his authority towards the Black Sea. When his brother, Andrew, Duke of Calabria, was assassinated in 1345, Louis accused Queen Joanna I of Naples of his murder and punishing her became the principal goal of his foreign policy. He launched two campaigns to the Kingdom of Naples between 1347 and 1350. His troops occupied large territories on both occasions, and Louis adopted the styles of Neapolitan sovereigns (including the title of King of Sicily and Jerusalem), but the Holy See never recognized his claim. Louis's arbitrary acts and atrocities committed by his mercenaries made his rule unpopular in Southern Italy. He withdrew all his troops from the Kingdom of Naples in 1351. It is understood the imitation of the Florence 'St John the Baptist' coinage dates to these campaigns.



This medal was presented to the King and close dignitaries on the occasion of his marriage to Cecylia Renata née Habsburg. Two versions of the medal with the image of Hercules are known. The present example is the first, depicting the Polish and Austrian eagles. The second version of the medal from 1637 does not refer to a wedding, but is a political tribute to the king by the Gdansk City Council. The wedding, and by extension this medal became a symbolic tribute to Wladyslaw's rule, not only as a warrior King, but also as a peace-bringer who brought prosperity to the Kingdom. The personification of Wladyslaw IV as Hercules fighting Cerberus is not only a direct allusion to the 'twelve labours', but also an allegory for Poland's traditional enemies: Moscow, Turkey and Sweden.





Every person interested should exercise and rely on his own judgment as to such matters.

3.3 Your Responsibility

You are responsible for satisfying yourself as to the condition of the goods and the matters referred to in the catalogue description.

3.4 Extensions - Stamps only

- 3.4.1 If you wish to obtain an expert opinion or Certificate of Authenticity on any Lot (other than a mixed Lot or Lot containing undescribed stamps) you must notify us in writing not less than forty-eight hours before the time fixed for the commencement of the first session of the sale. If accepted by us, such request shall have the same effect as notice of an intention to question the genuineness or description of the Lot for the purposes of clause 5.13 (Refund in the case of Forgery) of these Terms and Conditions and the provisions of clause 5.13 (Refund in the case of Forgery) shall apply accordingly.
- 3.4.2 Notice of a request for an expert opinion or Certificate of Authenticity must give the reason why such opinion is required and specify the identity of your proposed expert which will be subject to agreement by us. We reserve the right, at our discretion, to refuse a request for an expert opinion or Certificate of Authenticity including (without limitation) where the proposed expert is not known to us.

- **3.4.3** If we accept a request for an expert opinion or Certificate of Authenticity we will submit the Lot to the Expert Committee. You acknowledge and accept that the length of time taken by an Expert Committee to reach an opinion will vary depending on the circumstances and in any event is beyond our control.
- 3.4.4 We will not accept a request for an extension on account of condition. Any Lot described in the catalogue as having faults or defects may not be returned even if an expert opinion or Certificate of Authenticity cites other faults or defects not included in the catalogue description, other than in the case of a Forgery.
- 3.4.5 Should Spink accept a request for an extension under the foregoing provisions of this paragraph, the fact may be stated by the Auctioneer from the rostrum prior to the sale of the Lot.
- 3.4.6 It should be noted that any stamp accompanied by a Certificate of Authenticity is sold on the basis of that Certificate only and not on the basis of any other description or warranty as to authenticity. No request for an extension will be accepted on such a stamp and the return of such a stamp will not be accepted.
- 3.4.7 If you receive any correspondence from the Expert Committee in relation to the Lot, including but not limited to a Certificate of Authenticity, you must provide us with copies of such correspondence no later than 7 days after you receive such correspondence.

AT THE SALE

4.1 Refusal of admission

Our sales usually take place on our own premises or premises over which we have control for the sale, and we have the right, exercisable at our complete discretion, to refuse admission to the premises or attendance at an auction.

4.2 Registration before bidding

All bidders must be registered either by completing a registration form or creating an account online. Please be aware that we usually require buyers to present identification before making a bid at auction, undergo a credit check or provide a trade reference.

If you have not bid successfully with Spink in the past, or you are registering with us for the first time, we reserve the right to require a deposit of up to 50% of the amount you intend to spend. Such deposit will be deducted from your invoice should you be successful. If you are unsuccessful at auction, your deposit will be returned by the same means it was paid to Spink.

Some lots may be designated, prior to the auction, as "Premium Lots", which means a deposit may be required before placing a bid on the item for sale. Information will be posted on our website in such an event.

4.3 Bidding as Principal

When making a bid (whether such bids are made in person or by way of telephone bids operated by Spink, commission or online or email bids), you will be deemed to be acting as principal and will be accepting personal liability, unless it has been agreed in writing, at the time of registration, that you are acting as agent on behalf of a third party buyer acceptable to us.

4.4 Commission Bids

If you give us instructions to bid on your behalf, by using the form provided in our catalogues or via our website, we shall use reasonable endeavours to do so, provided these instructions are received not later than 24 hours before the auction. If we receive commission bids on a particular Lot for identical amounts, and at auction these bids are the highest bids for the Lot, it will be sold to the person whose bid was received first. Commission bids are undertaken subject to other commitments at the time of the sale, and the conduct of the auction may be such that we are unable to bid as requested. Since this is undertaken as a free service to prospective buyers on the terms stated, we cannot accept liability for failure to make a commission bid. You should therefore always attend personally if you wish to be certain of bidding.

45 **On-line Bidding**

We offer internet services as a convenience to our clients. We will not be responsible for errors or failures to execute bids placed on the internet, including, without limitation, errors or failures caused by (i) a loss of internet connection by either party for whatever reason; (ii) a breakdown or problems with the online bidding software and/or (iii) a breakdown or problems with your internet connection, computer or system. Execution of on-line internet bids on www.spink.com and Śpink Live is a free service undertaken subject to other commitments at the time of the auction and we do not accept liability for failing to execute an online internet bid or for errors or omissions in connection with this activity.

Telephone Bids 4.6

If you make arrangements with us not less than 24 hours before the sale, we shall use reasonable endeavours to contact you to enable you to participate in bidding by telephone, but in no circumstances will we be liable to either the Seller or you as a result of failure to do so.

4.7**Currency Converter**

At some auctions, a currency converter will be operated, based on the one month forward rates of exchange quoted to us by Barclays Bank Plc or any other appropriate rate determined by us, at opening on the date of the auction. Bidding will take place in a currency determined by us, which is usually sterling for auctions held in London. The currency converter is not always reliable, and errors may occur beyond our control either in the accuracy of the Lot number displayed on the converter, or the foreign currency equivalent of sterling bids. We shall not be liable to you for any loss suffered as a result of you following the currency converter.

4.8 Video images

At some auctions there will be a video screen. Mistakes may occur in its operation, and we cannot be liable to you regarding either the correspondence of the image to the Lot being sold or the quality of the image as a reproduction of the original.

4.9 **Bidding Increments**

Bidding generally opens below the low estimate and advances in the following order although the auctioneer may vary the bidding increments during the course of the auction. The normal bidding increments are:

- 4.10 Bidding by Spink 4.10.1 We reserve the right to bid on Lots on the Seller's behalf up to the amount of the Reserve (if any), which will never be above the low estimate printed in the auction catalogue.
 - 4.10.2 The Spink Group reserves the right to bid on and purchase Lots as principal
 - 4.10.3 Lots with this symbol () indicate that a party has provided Spink with an irrevocable bid on the lot that will be executed Spink with an interoceable bid on the for that with be executed during the sale at a value that ensures that the lot will sell. The irrevocable bidder, who may bid in excess of the irrevocable bid, will be compensated based on his bid in the event he or she is not the successful bidder or may receive a fixed fee in the event he or she is the successful bidder. If the irrevocable bidder is the successful bidder of the ford for for providing the irrevocable bid successful bidder, the fixed fee for providing the irrevocable bid may be netted against the irrevocable bidder's obligation to pay the full purchase price for the lot. If the irrevocable bid is not secured until after the printing of the auction catalogue, a pre-sale announcement will be made indicating that there is an irrevocable bid on the lot.

4.11 The Auctioneer's Discretion

The auctioneer has the right at his absolute discretion to refuse any bid to advance the bidding in such manner as he may decide to withdraw or divide any Lot, to combine any two or more Lots and, in the case of error or dispute, to put an item up for bidding again.

4.12 Successful Bid

Subject to the auctioneer's discretion, the striking of his hammer marks the acceptance of the highest bid, provided always that such bid is higher than the Reserve (where applicable), and the conclusion of a contract for sale between you and the Seller.

4.13 After Sale Arrangements

If you enter into any private sale agreements for any Lot with the Seller within 60 days of the auction, we, as exclusive agents of the Seller reserve the right to charge you the applicable Buyer's Premium in accordance with these Terms and Conditions, and the Seller a commission in accordance with the terms of the Seller's agreement.

4.14 Return of Lot

4.14.1 Once your bid has been accepted for a Lot then you are liable to pay for that Lot in accordance with these Terms and Conditions. If there are any problems with a Lot then you must notify us within 7 days of receipt of the Lot, specifying the nature of the problem. We may then request that the Lot is returned to us for inspection. Save as set out in clause 5.13, the cancellation of the sale of any Lot and the refund of the corresponding purchase price is entirely at our sole discretion. We will not normally exercise that discretion in the Lot is returned to use the same set discretion in the the Lot is not received by us in the same condition that it was in at the auction date.

4.14.2 No lot may be returned on account of condition if the condition was stated by a third party grading company (including, but not limited to PCGS, NGC, ANACS, ICG, PMG, WBG, Legacy Currency Grading).

AFTER THE AUCTION

5.1 Buyer's Premium and other charges

In addition to the Hammer Price, you must pay us the Buyer's Premium at a rate of 20% of the final Hammer price of each lot, postage charge and a fee for paying by card.

5.2 Value Added Tax

Other than in respect of Zero-rated Lots (o) VAT is chargeable on the Hammer price and the Buyer's premium of daggered (\uparrow) and (Ω) lots at the standard rate (currently 20%), and on lots marked (x) at the reduced rate (currently 5% on the Hammer price and 20% on the Buyer's premium). VAT on Margin scheme lots (identified by the absence of any VAT symbol next to the lot number) is payable at 20% on the Buyer's premium only. on the Buyer's premium only.

5.3 VAT Refunds - Buyers from outside the UK

- 5.3.1 As we remain liable to account for VAT on all Lots unless they have been exported outside the UK within 3 months of the date of sale, you will be asked to deposit all amounts of VAT invoiced. However, if a Spink nominated shipper is instructed, then any refundable VAT will not be collected. In all other cases refunds due will be made when valid proof of export is provided. For avoidance of doubt, please note refunds cannot be made to private Buyers, when Lots are bought for private use, if exported by the Buyer.
- 5.3.2 If you are registered as a collectibles business outside the UK and the Lots are invoiced to this business, are not for private use, if you export the Lots outside the UK yourself or appoint your own agent you must obtain shipping documents from the Shipping Department for which a charge of $\pounds 50$ will be made.
- 5.3.3 Where required, we can advise you on how to export Lots as a specific form of export evidence is required. Where we advise you on the export of the Lots, please be aware that the ultimate responsibility in respect of obtaining a valid proof of export will lie with you and we will not be responsible for your failure to obtain such proof.
- 5.3.4 If you export the Lot, subject to par. 5.3.2., you must return the valid proof of export to us within 3 months of the date of sale. If you fail to return the valid proof of export to us within such period and you have not already accounted to us for the VAT, you will be liable to us for the full amount of the VAT due on such Lot and we shall be entitled to invoice you for this sum.
- 5.3.5 To apply for a refund of any VAT paid, the valid proof of export must be sent to our Shipping Department clearly marked 'VAT Refund' within 3 months of the date of sale. No payment will be made where the total amount of VAT refundable is less than £50 and Spink will charge £50 for each refund processed.
- 5.3.6 Where a Lot is included within the Margin Scheme and Auctioneers' Scheme and valid evidence of export from the UK is produced within 3 months of the date of sale, the VAT on Buyer's Premium may be refunded.
- 5.3.7 Where the Lot is marked as a Daggered (†) Lot the VAT charged on the Hammer Price may be refunded where evidence of valid export from the UK is produced within 3 months of the date of sale. A refund of VAT charged on the Buyer's Premium can also be made on receipt of proof of registration as a collectibles business.
- 5.3.8 Where the Lot is marked as an Omega (Ω) Lot or an Import VAT (x) Lot and valid evidence of export from the UK is produced within 3 months of the date of sale, the VAT charged on both the Hammer Price and Buyer's Premium may be refunded.
- 5.3.9 Lot marked as Investment Gold (g) is exempt from VAT on Hammer price. A refund of VAT charged on the Buyer's Premium can be made on receipt of proof of registration as a collectibles business and where valid evidence of export from the UK is produced within 3 months of the date of sale.

5.4Payment

- 5.4.1 You must provide us with your full name and permanent address and, if so requested, details of the bank from which any payments to us will be made. You must pay the full amount due (comprising the Hammer Price, the Buyer's Premium and any applicable VAT) within seven days after the date of the sale. This applies even if you wish to export the Lot and an export licence is (or may be) required required.
- 5.4.2 You will not acquire title to the Lot until all amounts due have been paid in full. This includes instances where special arrangements were made for release of Lot prior to full settlement.
- 5.4.3 Payment should be made in sterling by one of the following methods:
 - (i) Direct bank transfer to our account details of which are set out on the invoice. All bank charges shall be met by you. Please ensure that your client number is noted on the transfer.
 - By cheque or bank draft made payable to Spink and Son Ltd (ii)by cheque of bank draft made payable to spink and son Ltd and sent to Spink at 69 Southampton Row, Bloomsbury, London WC1B 4ET. Please note that the processing charges for payments made by cheques or bank drafts drawn on a non-U.K bank shall be met by you. Please ensure that the remittance slip printed at the bottom of the invoice is enclosed with your payment.

- (iii) By Visa or Mastercard. All Corporate cards regardless of origin and Consumer debit and credit cards issued outside the UK are subject to a fee of 3%. For all card payments there are limits to the amounts we will accept depending on the type of card being used and whether or not the cardholder is present.
- 5.4.4 Payments should be made by the registered buyer and not by third parties, unless it has been agreed at the time of registration that you are acting as an agent on behalf of a third party.

5.5 Invoices

Invoices may consist of one or more pages and will show: Zero rated Lots (o); no symbol Lots sold under the Margin Scheme and Auctioneers' Scheme; Lots marked (g) special scheme Investment Gold; Daggered Lots (†), imported Lots marked (x) and (Ω).

5.6 Collection of Purchases

- 5.6.1 Unless specifically agreed to the contrary, we shall retain lots purchased until all amounts due to us, or to the Spink Group, have been paid in full. Buyers will be required to pay for their lots when they wish to take possession of the same, which must be within 7 days of the date of the sale, unless prior arrangements have been made with Spink. Without prior agreement, lots will not be released until cleared funds are received with regard to payments made by cheque.
- 5.6.2 Unless we notify you to the contrary, items retained by us will be covered in accordance with our policy which is available for inspection at our offices from the date of sale for a period of seven days or until the time of collection, whichever is sooner. After seven days or from the time of collection, whichever is the earlier, the Lot will be entirely at your risk.
- 5.6.3 Our policy will not cover and we are unable to accept responsibility for damage caused by woodworm, changes in atmospheric conditions or acts of terrorism.

5.7 Notification

We are not able to notify successful bidders by telephone. While Invoices are sent out by email or mail after the auction we do not accept responsibility for notifying you of the result of your bid. You are requested to contact us by telephone or in person as soon as possible after the auction to obtain details of the outcome of your bids to avoid incurring charges for late payment.

5.8 Packing and handling

- 5.8.1 We shall use all reasonable endeavours to take care when handling and packing a purchased Lot but remind you that after seven days or from the time of collection, whichever is sooner, the Lot is entirely at your risk. Our postage charges are set out at the back of the catalogue.
- 5.8.2 It is the responsibility of the Buyer to be aware of any Import Duties that may be incurred upon importation to the final destination. Spink will not accept return of any package in order to avoid these duties. The onus is also on the Buyer to be aware of any Customs import restrictions that prohibit the importation of certain collectibles. Spink will not accept return of the Lot(s) under these circumstances. Spink will not accept responsibility for Lot(s) seized or destroyed by Customs.
- 5.8.3 If the Buyer requires delivery of the Lot to an address other than the invoice address this will be carried out at the discretion of Spink.

5.9 Recommended packers and shippers

If required our shipping department may arrange shipment as your agent. Although we may suggest carriers if specifically requested, our suggestions are made on the basis of our general experience of such parties in the past and we are not responsible to any person to whom we have made a recommendation for the acts or omissions of the third parties concerned.

5.10 Remedies for non-payment or failure to collect purchases

- 5.10.1 If you fail to make payment within seven days of your stipulated payment date set out in your invoice, we shall be entitled to exercise one or more of the following rights or remedies:
 - 5.10.1.1 to charge interest at the rate of 2% per month compound interest, calculated on a daily basis, from the date the full amount is due;
 - 5.10.1.2 to set off against any amounts which the Spink Group may owe you in any other transaction the outstanding amount remaining unpaid by you;
 - 5.10.1.3 we may keep hold of all or some of your Lots or other property in the possession of the Spink Group until you have paid all the amounts you owe us or the Spink Group, even if the unpaid amounts do not relate to those Lots or other property. Following fourteen days' notice to you of the amount outstanding and remaining unpaid, the Spink Group shall have the right to arrange the sale of such Lots or other property. We shall apply the proceeds in discharge of the amount outstanding to us or the Spink Group, and pay any balance to you;
 - 5.10.1.4 where several amounts are owed by you to the Spink Group in respect of different transactions, to apply any amount paid to discharge any amount owed in respect of any particular transaction, whether or not you so direct;
 - 5.10.1.5 to reject at any future auction any bids made by you or on your behalf or obtain a deposit from you before accepting any bids.
- 5.10.2 If you fail to make payment within thirty-five days, we shall in addition be entitled:
 - 5.10.2.1 to cancel the sale of the Lot or any other item sold to you at the same or any other auction;

- 5.10.2.2 to arrange a resale of the Lot, publicly or privately, and, if this results in a lower price being obtained, claim the balance from you together with all reasonable costs including a 20% seller's commission, expenses, damages, legal fees, commissions and premiums of whatever kind associated with both sales or otherwise, incurred in connection with your failure to make payment;
- 5.10.2.3 when reselling the Lot, place a notice in our catalogue stating that you successfully purchased the Lot at auction but have subsequently failed to pay the Hammer Price of the Lot; or 5.10.2.4 take any other appropriate action as we deem fit.
- 5.10.2.1 face any other appropriate action as we deem in: 5.10.3 If you fail to collect within fourteen days after the sale, whether
 - or not payment has been made, you will be required 5.10.3.1 to pay a storage charge of $\pounds 2$ per item per day plus any additional handling cost that may apply.
 - 5.10.3.2 you will not be entitled to collect the Lot until all outstanding charges are met, together with payment of all other amounts due to us.
- 5.11 Use of Default Information

If you fail to make payment for a Lot in accordance with these Terms and Conditions:

- 5.11.1 we reserve the right to refuse you the right to make bids for any future auction irrespective of whether previous defaults have been settled; and
- 5.11.2 you acknowledge that we may (as necessary for our legitimate interests those of other auctioneers and live bidding platforms in referencing customers and avoiding customer defaults) disclose details of such default to other auctioneers and live bidding platforms, which will include your name, address, nature of the default and the date of the default.

Auctioneers or live bidding platforms who receive details of the default may rely on such information when deciding whether to enter into a transaction with you in the future.

- 5.12 Export Licence
 - 5.12.1 If required we can, at our discretion, advise you on the detailed provisions of the export licensing regulations. Where we advise you in relation to export licensing regulations the ultimate responsibility in respect of any export will lie with you and we will not be responsible for your failure to apply for any necessary licences.
 - 5.12.2 If the Lot is going to be hand carried by you, you may be required to produce a valid export licence to us or sign a waiver document stating that a licence will be applied for.
 - 5.12.3 You should always check whether an export licence is required before exporting. Export licences are usually obtained within two or three weeks but delays can occur.
 - 5.12.4 Unless otherwise agreed by us in writing, the fact that you wish to apply for an export licence does not affect your obligation to make payment within seven days nor our right to charge interest on late payment.
 - 5.12.5 If you request that we apply for an export licence on your behalf, we shall be entitled to recover from you our disbursements and out of pocket expenses in relation to such application, together with any relevant VAT.
 - 5.12.6 We will not be obliged to rescind a sale nor to refund any interest or other expenses incurred by you where payment is made by you despite the fact that an export licence is required.

5.13 Refund in the case of Forgery

- 5.13.1 A sale will be cancelled, and the amount paid refunded to you if a Lot (other than a miscellaneous item not described in the catalogue) sold by us proves to have been a Forgery. We shall not however be obliged to refund any amounts if either (a) the catalogue description or saleroom notice at the auction date corresponded to the generally accepted opinion of scholars or experts at that time, or fairly indicated that there was a conflict of opinions, or (b) it can be demonstrated that the Lot is a Forgery only by means of either a scientific process not generally accepted for use until after publication of the catalogue or a process which at the date of the auction was unreasonably expensive or impracticable or likely to have caused damage to the Lot. Furthermore, you should note that this refund can be obtained only if the following conditions are met:
 - 5.13.1.1 you must notify us in writing, within seven days of the receipt of the Lot(s), that in your view the Lot concerned is a Forgery;
 - 5.13.1.2 you must then return the item to us within fourteen days from receipt of the Lot(s), in the same condition as at the auction date; and
 - 5.13.1.3 as soon as possible following return of the Lot, you must produce evidence satisfactory to us that the Lot is a Forgery and that you are able to transfer good title to us, free from any third party claims.
 - 5.13.1.4 you must provide to us all evidence obtained by you that a Lot is a Forgery no later than 7 days after you receive such evidence.
- 5.13.2 In no circumstances shall we be required to pay you any more than the amount paid by you for the Lot concerned and you shall have no claim for interest.
- 5.13.3 The benefit of this guarantee is not capable of being transferred, and is solely for the benefit of the person to whom the original invoice was made out by us in respect of the Lot when sold and who, since the sale, has remained the owner of the Lot without disposing of any interest in it to any third party.
- 5.13.4 We shall be entitled to rely on any scientific or other process to establish that the Lot is not a Forgery, whether or not such process was used or in use at the date of the auction.

6 LIABILITY

Nothing in these Terms and Conditions limits or excludes our liability for:

- 6.1 death or personal injury resulting from negligence; or
- 6.2 any damage or liability incurred by you as a result of our fraud or fraudulent misrepresentation.

7 USE OF YOUR PERSONAL INFORMATION

- 7.1 We will use the personal information you provide to us as set out in our privacy notice (available at https://spink.com/privacy-policy) and in particular to:
 - 7.1.1 process the bids you make on Lots (whether successful or otherwise) and other auction related services we provide;
 - 7.1.2 process your payment relating to a successful purchase of a Lot;
 - 7.1.3 arrange for delivery of any Lot you purchase, which will include passing your details to shipping providers and, on overseas deliveries, to customs where they make enquiries regarding the Lot;
 - 7.1.4 inform you about similar products or services that we provide, but you may stop receiving these at any time by contacting us.
- 7.2 In accordance with clause 4.2, we may pass your information to credit reference agencies in order to obtain credit checks from them, and they may keep a record of any search that they do.
- 7.3 In accordance with clause 5.11, where you default on making payment for a Lot in accordance with these terms and conditions we may disclose details of such default to other auctioneers and live bidding platforms.
- 7.4 We are also working closely with third parties (including, for example, other auctioneers and live bidding platforms) and may receive information about you from them.
- 7.5 Where you provide us with personal information about other individuals, you must ensure that your provision of that information is compliant with applicable data protection law.

8 COPYRIGHT

- 8.1 We shall have the right (on a non-exclusive basis) to photograph, video or otherwise produce an image of the Lot. All rights in such an image will belong to us, and we shall have the right to use it in whatever way we see fit.
- 8.2 The copyright in all images, illustrations and written material relating to a Lot is and shall remain at all times our property and we shall have the right to use it in whatever way we see fit. You shall not use or allow anyone else to use such images, illustrations or written material without our prior written consent.

9 VAT

You shall give us all relevant information about your VAT status and that of the Lot to ensure that the correct information is printed in the catalogues. Once printed, the information cannot be changed. If we incur any unforeseen cost or expense as a result of the information being incorrect, you will reimburse to us on demand the full amount incurred.

10 NOTICES

All notices given under these Terms and Conditions may be served personally, sent by 1st class post, or faxed to the address given to the sender by the other party. Any notice sent by post will be deemed to have been received on the second working day after posting or, if the addressee is overseas, on the fifth working day after posting. Any notice sent by fax or served personally will be deemed to be delivered on the first working day following despatch.

11 ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS

The following provisions of this clause 11 shall apply only if you are acting for the purposes of your business.

11.1 Limitation of Liability

Subject to clause 6, we shall not be liable, whether in tort (including for negligence) or breach of statutory duty, contract, misrepresentation or otherwise for any:

- 11.1.1 loss of profits, loss of business, depletion of goodwill and/or similar losses, loss of anticipated savings, loss of goods, loss of contract, loss of use, loss of corruption of data or information; or
- 11.1.2 any special, indirect, consequential or pure economic loss, costs, damages, charges or expenses.

11.2 Severability

If any part of these Terms and Condition is found by any court to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable, that part may be discounted and the rest of the conditions shall continue to be valid and enforceable to the fullest extent permitted by law.

11.3 Force majeure


